## Teen Hopes Sign Will Get Road Repaired

Seventeen year old Brandon Millen of Little Dyke recently got physical with his frustrations. Tired of having to travel a road filled with pot holes to get back and forth to his home, he decided it was time to make a point and he used physical strength to construct something that he hoped might help

get the road fixed.

"A guy who works for my dad said I should put up a sign to draw attention to the condition of our road," says Brandon. "We had a snow day from school in early April and so we decided to build a sign

The sign reads "Donations to fix road government funds ran out" and it is located at the Little Dyke Road entrance, on the side closest to Great Village, along Highway #2. The large sign is attached to a barrel with a bottle for donations

"I didn't really expect to get any money in the bottle," says Brandon. "I just put it there to make a point, that we want the road paved. We pay taxes

and we should be able to get some of our money put back into fixing this road."

Brandon had help from his brother Nathan and friend Mitchell MacNeil, in fact Nathan funded the \$132 needed for supplies.

The construction team decided on bright fluores-cent green and orange paint to make the sign highly visible. The decision

worked out perfectly and people passing the sign soon began to take notice. Brandon received a great deal of coverage in the media, including an interview on CBC and ATV

The poor condition of the road is not unique to just this year, Brandon says that it gets this way every year and then a highway's crew comes along and puts some asphalt in the holes.

Brandon would like to see the road completely paved so that the repairs would be more permanent and he has good reason to be especially concerned this year. "I just bought a car three months ago and I don't want to ruin it yet," says Brandon.

## Vehicle Inspection Schedule Changes

The Province of Nova Scotia has made changes to the Motor Vehicle Inspection system. The changes became effective on April 1, 2009. It is important to note the vehicle you are currently driving will still have to be inspected on the due date at which time a new schedule will become effective:

New type 1 vehicles which includes passenger cars, SUV's, mini-vans, trucks and trailers under 4501 kg

motorcycles, motor-homes, and travel trailers do not require an inspection for the first three years provided the

every two years.

All Type 2 vehicles, which includes trucks over 4500 kg. trailers over 4500 kg, taxis, ambulances, fire vehicles, tow trucks, hearses, and buses not licensed as public passenger vehicles still require an annual inspection.
