Afterwards Reid remained out west working as an Assistant Researcher at Vancouver General Hospital in the Spinal Unit. While there, Sandra attended a seminar on the ethics of stem cell research where she was exposed to topical issues in ethics which were not widely discussed in Canada at the time.

Sandra was encouraged by the keynote speaker to apply to his graduate program at the University of Otago. Within a month, Sandra applied, was accepted and rerouting herself down south! That was at the beginning of 2007.

Early in 2009, Sandra completed her graduate thesis titled, "Informed Consent in Pharmacogenetic Research in New Zealand: and ethical and legal analysis".

The official graduation cerwas held on emony December 12th, 2009 for the Health Sciences Faculty consisting of 550 students. Sandra was one of only two graduates receiving the Masters of Bioethics and Health Law (MBHL).
