
Historic Sites Along The Shore - SIMPSON BARREL FACTORY

The Shoreline Journal, in collaboration with the Colchester Historical Society Archives, have inaugurated an ongo-ing feature utilizing a combination of the digital "A. F. Church Maps" to pin point the circa 1875 location of a Colchester site of historical importance, and connect it to an archival photograph of that site, in that frame.



On Map # 318, the arrow points out the carpenter shop of William Simpson in Carr's Brook, which by 1879 had developed into the barrel factory pictured. The export of salt shad fish had developed into a thriving industry by this time

and barrels were in great demand . This shop also produced



doors and windows and powered by a steam engine, which was manufactured by Robb Engineering of Amherst.

The shad fishery was carried out both by boat and weir (trap). The two man shad boats of this era were generally 6 m to 7.2 m long, with a beam of 2m to 2.4m. Drift nets were 350m to 550m. long . Sails and oars were used to get the boat out into the bay, and then the ebb and flow of the tide provided the locomotion. Weir fishing is still carried on in the Economy and Five Islands area. In 1870 some 3729 barrels of shad were shipped to market from West Colchester, generally in the Eastern United States.




