Becky Brenton, Crowes Mills, has travelled to many exciting places during her 26 years as a travel agent but a recent trip to Japan ranks as one of the most enjoyable. Becky travelled on this weeklong adventure in December, with 10 other Carlson Wagonlit Travel agents from across Canada; she was the only one from the Maritimes.

The purpose of the trip was to experience as much of the culture, scenery, tourist destinations and transportation system as possible to be better able to offer advice to clients who may wish to travel in Japan.

Becky says there was a lot packed into the 7 days and she thinks she experienced nearly every form of travel. "We flew into Tokyo, took airport transfers, buses, the high speed train and rural train, tour bus and taxis. Travel was extremely easy, with signs and announcements in both English and Japanese."

Most restaurants had English menus available or artificial plates of fake food for you to look at before ordering but Becky thought she would be adventurous and try ordering from a Japanese menu the first night. "I decided to order shrimp and using my translation book I asked if it was cooked. When the waitress brought the dish it was only the shrimp heads. I set this aside and decided to try a chicken shish kabob but it turned out to be just chicken skin on a stick. Once I caught on to reading the menus, the food was actually very delicious."

The group travelled

throughout central region of Japan. There were visits to a geisha house, a samurai house, beautiful gardens, temples and shrines, several World UNESCO Heritage Sights, including the Golden Pavilion -World Cultural Heritage Site, and much more. On the train ride to Takayama, weather permitted a clear view of Mount Fuji.

Becky was amazed on a bus ride to Kanazawa, which involved driving through mountain passes and tunnels as long as 11km. "On the way we made a must see stop at the Shirakawa World Unesco Heritage site (only living onepeople live and work there still!) And it was fantastic. You felt like you walked into a storybook and gingerbread village. I am sure I will never be in another place quite like it anywhere else."

Tokyo Disney was a must see stop for Becky, also "It completed my 'hat trick' of Disney Parks," she says. "I can now say I have been to all five Disney Parks in the world."

The Japanese people were extremely polite and helpful, and no one ever complained if lines were long or if the trains were crowded. On one bus ride there was a group of students on board and they immediately stood to give their seats to seniors as they boarded," says Becky. "Everyone was quiet and calm as they squished onto a crowded train at rush hour."

One night was spent at Hosho Kaku Ryokan, a traditional Japanese inn. Guests slept on mats on a woven straw floor and no shoes were worn inside. They all wore traditional Japanese dress and were provided with a traditional Japanese supper and breakfast and an opportunity for a traditional Japanese bath was also offered.

Travellers need not worry about other bathroom facilities. "Western style toilets were available everywhere, in addition to the squatter Japanese style, even on the trains. They were actually deluxe models with heated toilet seats," laughs Becky.

Becky found Japan very neat, clean and organized. She never saw any garbage and noticed the leaves were even swept off the sidewalks every couple of days. It was quite a challenge to even find a garbage can as people just take their waste home with them or shopkeepers dispose of it.

She felt they really catered to the tourists in every way possible, including a user friendly system for transporting baggage from one hotel to another. This service was very affordable and made it much easier to travel by train. "You take a small carry-on with you and when you arrive at your destination your bulky luggage is there waiting, for a minimal charge of about \$12- 15." She says they seem to think of the little things that could make a trip more convenient, even a vending machine which dispensed clean shirts, ties and underwear.

Shopping was enjoyable on the trip as well, including a trip to the 100 Yen Store (which compared to our Dollar Stores).

Japan had not been a place Becky had ever thought of going to before but she says she would be excited to go back again soon. "Journey's of Discovery, a tour company for Carlson Wagonlit Travel, organized the tour and they did a fabulous job. They only thing I would suggest is to take more time as there is just so much to experience," says Becky. "CWT- Harvey's Travel is currently putting together a travel package for this fall and I would highly recommend this trip to anyone. It is only a ten hour flight from Vancouver and once you arrive there is an unlimited amount of beautiful scenery and a wealth of culture to experience."




