She started with her father's old tubers, which had been handed down in the family over the generations. As the Dexters worked in their new garden, they were puzzled by one particular car which often drove very slowly past their garden. One day the driver stopped and came in to introduce himself. It turned out to be a kindred gardener and admirer of gladiolas and dahlias - Arthur Haskins. After meeting Arthur, the Dexter's began cultivating the new varieties of dahlias.

About 15 years ago, Carol started collecting her own seeds from selected plants. She currently has several new seedlings being developed. She has to grow them for 4 years to make sure they keep their form and colour. In the meantime, she exhibits them at various flower shows and exhibitions, attempting to win first place or a higher award.

Cobequid Daphne is one seedling which has won many awards. At the American Dahlia Society Seedling bench, it won the Rosetta Award. To obtain entry into a classification book, which is the highest achievement in flower competitions, a bloom must get 85 points or more. Carol has two of her seedlings in the classification book now: Cobequid Frosty and

Cobequid Daphne.

After thanking Carol for sharing her lovely garden with us, we moved on to Faith Baptist Church for our business meeting. This year's 4-H prize donated by our Garden Club was won by senior 4-H member, Alicia Cox. Members Wilfred Miller and Sybil Flemming were thanked for keeping the welcome sign beds in good order this summer.

It was noted that people have harvested some apples from the Community Orchard.

Members brought in samples of the calendula flowers which were grown from the seeds given out in the spring. Calendula had been chosen as the test perennial for the year. Everyone was pleased with the results.


Terry Hearn of CoRDA says," Jeff Brown has present-
