library and literacy during the last six years," says Cara.

She received an email in May stating that she had been preselected as a torch bearer and it included release forms, which she signed and returned.

"I received final notification the first week of October, saying I would be a participant and telling me the route information," she says. "The letter says I will receive and official Olympic Torch Bearer uniform to wear, which will be mine to keep afterwards."

Cara was not aware of anyone else who had applied but says, "It's very exciting to be involved in this once in a lifetime experience. My children insist they will need the day off school to come and cheer me on."

She hopes other friends and family might show up along the route at 9:20AM from MacPhee Terrace to House #644 on Rte 2, Elmsdale.

Ralph Bastarache first saw the RBC Carry the Torch Contest advertised on television back in January or February. "I saw the commercials and thought that this is truly a once in a lifetime opportunity," he says. The application asked that you help make Canada a better place, though volunteering, environmentalism or your own unique contribution. "I decided that I would reduce my overall environmental footprint by eliminating as much paper as possible and receive epost where applicable," says Ralph.

The preselection email came to Ralph in August and he also just received final confirmation the first week of October. "I am very excited and honoured to have been selected for the OTR. It is a memory that I will always have and lets face it, it is the closest I am ever going to get to being an Olympian," laughs Ralph. He knows many friends and family who applied to the contest, as well, but none were selected.

Ralph hopes many of them will come to New Glasgow at 4:00PM on Nov. 17th and cheer him along the route. "I am sure it will be a day that I will remember forever."
