
Onslow-Belmont 4-H Club



Morrison Family Reunion COBEQUID PLANTERS 250

By this time you are probably aware that our area is celebrating the arrival of the Cobequid Planters who settled here 250 years ago. "The Planters were English-speaking settlers from New England and Ireland who settled along the Cobequid Coast and Central and Northern Nova Scotia (1760-1761)." [The Shoreline Journal, March 2011, p. 20]

I am a seventh-generation descendant of John Morrison, who settled in Truro; within five years, the Archibalds who had settled in Little Dyke, traded land with the Morrisons (the Corbetts did a similar exchange).

Is the settling of this area by these people worthwhile recognizing? I think it is.

I am planning to hold a reunion for descendants of the Morrisons July 7 through July 10, to take place at the Debert Hospitality Centre and Erskine United Church in Glenholme, NS.

I have no former experience with planning family reunions, and am naturally terrified that I will forget something that is always done at

such events. I have mailed letters inviting relatives to the event. Unfortunately, I don't have many names for Morrison descendants in this area. I strongly suspect that if you grew up along the Cobequid Bay, you will find that you are related to the Morrisons as well as other Cobequid Planters.
