This year the Debert Military Museum Official Opening will offer something special - an opportunity to experience a working WWII camp onsite.

This Bird Not Flying the Coop

For some people it is just natural to adopt stray cats when they wonder into their yards but stray chickens?

Don and Ann Geldart, of Debert, were quite surprised when they looked out at their bird feeders last October and there among the flocks of regular songbirds was a white Leghorn chicken.

They had no idea where it came from, and figured it would just pass on through, but when they looked out the next morning the chicken was still there.
