Glooscap Trail 4-H'ers HOLD CLUB RALLY



HOSPICE Needs Your Help

80% of Canadians say they would like to die at home but 70% are forced to die in hospital.

On Sunday, May 6, volunteers, board members, staff, community care givers and families whose lives have been touched by hospice palliative care will gather together to Hike for Hospice

This year the Colchester East Hants Hospice Society is mixing things up to encourage participation. On May 6, the Truro Trailblazers Hiking Club will have their 5k season kickoff in Victoria Park in support of the Hike for Hospice initiative. "We encourage everyone to come out and hike, whether you want to partake on a 5k adventurous hike with the Trailblazers, or a short 2k stroll through the beautiful park," says Sharpe, "the purpose of this event is to show your support in any way you feel comfortable, and to have some fun!"

Hike for Hospice is a national event, with thousands of participants across Canada. The Hike is hoping to be sponsored by many local businesses and is sponsored nationally by Bayshore Home Health and the GlaxoSmithKline Foundation. All money raised in the Colchester East Hants area will stay within the communi-

ties. Last year over \$5,000 was raised in Hike for Hospice for the region, with over 1 million dollars raised across Canada. Funds raised locally in this year's Hike will be used to support the programs and services offered to families facing end of life and to those grieving the death of a loved one.

According to Statistics Canada, more than 259,000 Canadians die each year, and that number is projected to increase to more than 330,000 by 2020. Almost 75% of those who die each year in Canada would benefit from hospice palliative care, yet currently, according to the Canadian Hospice Palliative Care Association, a recent study has shown that no more than 36% of those who need palliative care will have access to it. Colchester East Hants Hospice Society is working to ensure that more people in our region receive the end-of-life care and support that they and their families need.
