

Municipality of the County of Colchester Low Income Tax Exemption

SUBMISSION DEADLINE - MAY 11, 2012

Residential property owners may be eligible for an exemption on their 2012/2013 property taxes, up to a maximum of \$ 277.86. To qualify, applicants must own and occupy the property and fall into one of the categories in the table below:

Family Size	Gross Income	Exemptio
single	Less than \$22,154	\$166,72
family of 2	Less than \$29,150	5222.28
family of 3 or more	Less than \$34,980	\$277.86

Gross Income refers to the total gross income from all sources for the calendar year ending December 31, 2011. This must include the income of all members of the household, except full-time students, however, you should not include income from the following sources:

- War Veterans Allowance Act (Canada);
- 2. Pension from Veterans Affairs Canada;
- Child Tax Benefit; or
- . GST Rebate

Application forms will automatically be mailed to last year's successful applicants. If you did not receive the exemption last year, you may obtain an application from the Municipal Tax Office, 1 Church Street Truro, or by calling 897-3150.

For income verification purposes, please bring a <u>COPY</u> of your 2011 Income Tax <u>FILING</u> <u>FORM</u>, which you submitted to Revenue Canada, when submitting your application.
