Springhill residents are getting a shocking 125th birthday present after council voted to apply to the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board to dissolve the town and become part of the Municipality of the County of Cumberland on April 1, 2015. John Leefe, former Mayor of Queens Municipality and a provincial cabinet minister has been appointed to oversee the transition.

Mayor Max Snow said the town's finances should not come as a surprise to residents. He said the town does not have the money to pave its streets, has a substantial debt in its operational and capital budgets and water utility and already has among the highest property taxes in the province.

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
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Are you dipping into next year's wood?

I can vouch that the training involving full turnout gear and breathing apparatus can and is an intense part of fire training. You have a black bag over your face mask, it is pitch black in the rooms which you are instructed to search for

the person or fire, and you have to keep your team mate attached to your leg at all times.

Ok, start at the door way, turn left or right, sweep and search, tag the wall don't leave it, use your arms and stay low, do not stand up, yell to your partner all the times, you are lead searcher, and you have the enviable job to keep them with you.

Then you get lost in a hall way, take your time, retrace your route in your mind, feel the heat, listen for someone moaning, a child crying, check behind doors, check the beds, and closets, check and recheck. Ok, you have found the victim, one hundred and eighty pounds of dead weight. Now your partner begins to help, drag, go back, drag, go back, stay low, retrace, keep your partner with you, and drag again.

Finally you get to the doorway. Don't stand up yell your training instructor, stay low, get your victim to a safe distance. There goes your alarm on your air bottles. Time is up boys.

And that is only the first session of training that night.

The life of a volunteer fireman is full of training, and for the sake of his or her communities, they continue to answer the calls for help. Thank you from the hall.

Keep your pipes clean, and join us at the hall and join up, every Monday evening.
