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Mental health supports offered to children and youth, through school facilities like youth health centres is one of four recommendations put forward by the Minister's Advisory Panel on Innovation in Mental Health and Addictions. The province will implement all four recommendations. The province will also provide an additional \$4.4-million as a permanent investment in SchoolsPlus by 2019-20. This will support all schools in the province and add about 51 new mental health clinicians, SchoolsPlus facilitators and community outreach workers. The four recommendations include: Create a single web and mobile-based platform and 24/7 live answer, toll-free phone line to provide consistent access to mental health and addictions information, support and services province-wide. Ensure access to live counselling for youth; Ensure developmentally appropriate, evidence-based, consistent mental health and addictions curriculum at the primary to six level, as well as for students in grades nine and grade twelve; Develop a standard model for mental health/health-care delivery by integrating the supports and services offered by youth health centres, Schools Plus and Early Development Centres. The services provided must be evidence and needs-based, client-focused and youth-friendly, providing a full scope of needed supports and interventions and all mental health service providers must receive evidence-based suicide risk assessment and suicide risk management training.

Effective April 1 Nova Scotia is adopting changes to the National Building Code, which include increasing the maximum height of wooden residential buildings from four to six storeys. The Fire Safety Act and Regulations will also be changed to enhance safety requirements for the taller wood buildings. The province is also updating its own accessibility regulations to improve barrier-free provisions in washrooms, requirements for power door operators and barrier-free paths of travel. Premier Stephen McNeil announced \$300,000 in funding from the 150 Forward Fund to Grand-Pré 2017 - A Peace and Unity Gathering of the Mi'kmaq and Acadian Nations in a project that will commemorate the 150th anniversary of Confederation by celebrating the historic relationship between the Mi'kmaq and Acadians. Grand-Pré 2017 is a series of cultural and educational events presented by the Ulnooweg Development Group. They take place during a four-day, multi-disciplinary festival in August 2017. Federal funding has also been provided through four departments and agencies: the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency, the Department of Canadian Heritage, Parks Canada, and Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada. Indigenous women and children fleeing domestic violence will soon have a safe new place to call home, with the help of government funding for affordable second-stage housing. Second-stage housing is longer-term, individual housing, where tenants can live for an extended time. It offers programs and services to help them transition to independent living. The provincial and federal governments have committed up to \$824,000 for the four-unit development, addressing the unique needs of urban indigenous families. Through this project, the Mi'kmaq Native Friendship Centre, Gottingen Street, Halifax plans to provide support services for victims of domestic violence, including counselling, parenting and employment programs.

Renovating an unused operating room at the Hants Community Hospital in Windsor will mean 800 more surgeries at the hospital each year, nearly doubling the annual number of procedures. This is part of the QEII Redevelopment Project which will see services transferred from the QEII Health Sciences Centre to support the eventual closure of the Victoria and Centennial buildings at the VG site. Currently, the Hants Community Hospital has one functional operating room. A second operating room, dating back to when the hospital was originally built in 1976, will be renovated and prepared for use. The project is expected to cost about \$3.8 million. Construction is expected to begin in August and be completed over a three-month period. Surgeries that would normally be done at the hospital during that time will be performed at other facilities in the province. The QEII redevelopment includes projects at the Halifax Infirmary, Dartmouth General Hospital, Hants Community Hospital and other sites.

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April 23-29 Declared Volunteer Week

Acting on a letter from Craig Burgess, Manager of Recreation Services, Colchester council proclaimed the week of April 23-29 as Volunteer week to coincide with other municipalities and the provincial initiative.

In other matters handled at its monthly meeting on February 23rd, council approved staff form an ad hoc working group to investigate the development of a collaboration with Northern Zone, Nova Scotia Health Authority, on matters of community wellness of mutual concern; and, That at the appropriate stage of the working group's investigation, other jurisdictional leaders be invited to have their staff join the discussion; and, That the Colchester Working Group on Community Wellness report back to Council with their findings, including recommendations and required resources, within three months.

For the Cobequid Trailhead Council authorized staff to proceed with a purchase and

sale agreement for a parcel of land located at No. 236 Highway, Lower Truro, PID # 20449708, at a purchase price of \$37,000, with source of funds being the Parkland Reserve. The Mayor and CAO were authorized to execute the Purchase and Sale Agreement.

To add more Recreation Land on Ventura Drive, Debent council authorized staff to proceed with a purchase and sale agreement for a parcel of land located at 44 Ventura Drive, Debent, PID # 20445938, at a purchase price of \$25,000, with source of funds being the Debent Sale of Houses. Mayor and CAO are authorized to execute the Purchase and Sale Agreement.

Council approved the Neighbourhood Event Road Closure Policy be approved as presented to staff at the February 15th committee meeting. Council approved the Balefill Closure Liability bank funds be invested in the Principal Protected Notes recommended, as presented by staff, which will be more advantageous and save the

municipality money.

The building permit activity report for January showed permits totaling \$7,784,500 had been issued, which was a significant increase over January 2016 permits totaling \$1,385,500. The \$5.575-

Million permit issued to Green Diamond Equipment accounted for the significant monthly increase.

For the overall fiscal year, issued permits totaling \$35.771-Million are \$2.455-Million less 2016 \$36.226-Million for the same time.
