## Volunteers Make Ten Thousand Villages Happen

Truro has hosted Ten Thousand Villages sales for 25 years and during that time Truro Sales has reinvested \$575,000 into global communities. Ten years ago a pre-Mother's Day sale was added enabling the community to offer two Fair Trade sale events a year; one in the spring and one in the Christmas season. The next sale is May 4, 5, 2019 at St Andrews United church, King St Truro.

A dedicated team of local volunteers logged thousands of volunteer hours. The team's mission is to create opportunities for artisans and food growers in developing countries to earn income by bringing their products and stories to our markets through long-term fair-trading relationships.

The income from the sale of these products helps pay for food, education, health care and housing and visibly raises the standard of living in the communities where the artisans and farmers live. Ten Thousand Villages makes a difference for over 20,000 artisans and food growers in 66 countries in 26 countries.

One of the many groups that supplies Ten Thousand Villages inventory is Mai Handicrafts

in Vietnam. It is a non-profit organization founded by social workers concerned about the plight of street children in Ho Chi Minh City. When it began, schooling was only available to those who held legal papers and could afford the tuition fees. Street children were excluded. Mai Handicrafts gave work to youth and provided them with informal literacy classes. Now that schooling is free for all children in Vietnam, Mai Handicrafts provides work for the marginalized, including women and ethnic minority groups. Artisans receive social and health care insurance and may apply for scholarship funds.

Each sale in Truro engages at least 40 volunteers. The two festival sales in Truro are: Friday, May 3rd (10 a.m. - 9 p.m.) and Saturday, May 4th (10 a.m. - 5 p.m.) at St. Andrew's United Church and Friday, November 29 (10 a.m. - 8 p.m.) and Saturday, November 30 (10 a.m. - 5 p.m.) at Immanuel Baptist Church.
