

More Suffering Predicted from Latest Carbon Tax Increase

When the Trudeau government's phase 2 carbon tax went into effect April 1, 2023, gasoline prices in Cumberland-Colchester shot up 14 cents a litre. It was as if a bomb dropped. The effects were immediate, and every sector of the economy began to bleed.

At the farm level, production prices soared. Far more expensive fuel meant increased costs to transport goods to market, and by the time big box store grocers took their healthy cuts, food prices had increased so much that working people began lining up at food banks because they couldn't afford to shop at grocery stores.

Higher heating costs hit homeowners, creating the 'heat or eat' dilemma. Landlords hiked rents, creating havoc for tenants, many of whom were forced out into the streets, adding to the homeless pandemic.

People with marginal incomes, notably seniors, began choosing between food and prescription drugs.

Inflation soared. The central bank raised interest rates an unprecedented five times during the year. Mortgages doubled, creating calamity in the real estate market. Homeowners with looming renewals faced huge monthly hikes or risked losing them.

At the root of this downward spiral is the Trudeau government's Carbon Tax, bent on reducing greenhouse gases to an imaginary base zero by 2050.

So it is, that as of April 1, 2024, Cumberland-Colchester is faced with phase 3, and its resultant 23-per cent increase on commodities such as gas heat and groceries. Canada's economy can only suffer substantially more in 2024.

Stephen Emmerson is a Cumberland County businessman. His company, Emmerson Packaging, is a net exporter of products — 70 per cent of is transported outside of Canada.

"We are already disadvantaged to USA competitors that have lower taxes, labour, and gas prices, he says. This burdensome (carbon) tax does nothing to improve the lives

of Canadians, by making us less competitive on the North American and/or the global markets."

Further, manufacturer Emmerson says a further increase in the Carbon Tax will discourage foreign investment in Canada.

"Over the last eight years, Canada has gone from the fourth best country in the world to invest into the 14th.

Draconian regulations and taxation are the primary reasons for this dramatic drop in investment in Canada."

Domestically, another increase in the Carbon Tax will hit Canadians hard, Emmerson says.

"As the cost to invest or do business in Canada continues to rise, this will lead to further declines in Canada's gross domestic product (GDP). Canada continues to fall behind other industrialized nations regarding real growth. The additional Carbon Tax is just one more inhibitor for investment and real growth for Canadians."

On the international front, Emmerson criticizes the Trudeau government's asser-

tion that small-player Canada will be carbon neutral by 2050.

"The ridiculous goal of 'net zero' is a political myth being propagated by globalist idealists. For every coal burning plant the West shuts off, China turns on 10. That takes us one step closer to China being the dominate economic leader. If that is truly the goal, let's just be honest about the Canadian Government's initiatives."

A Common Sense Conservative government will axe the tax and Canadians will have the opportunity to decide for themselves in the upcoming carbon tax election.
