Sea-Mail Answer Received

Tossed into the ocean on a summer holiday, a note in a bottle recently brought a nine year old Belmont resident a very long distance reply.

Each August Michaela Priest and her family vacation at Old Shipyard Campground along the Bay of Fundy. They always take a boat ride and four years

Valerie Priest suggested they put a note into a bottle and drop it into the ocean.

Michaela and her younger sister Mallory always hoped that they would hear back from someone who might find their bottle. They were pleased when they received a few replies, one from Parrsboro and one from Kentville, but a recent letter was a very unexpected surprise.

"When I saw the post mark on the letter with my name on it. I had no idea who it could be from, as we don't know anyone in the United Kindom," said Michaela.

The letter was written by 87 year old Bill Batt of Sunderland in the United Kingdom. He wrote the letter on behalf of his wife Joy, who passed away from cancer in

Michaela, who is now nine years old, put the note in the bottle back when she was only 7 years of age.

The bottle made it's way from off the coast of Spencer's Island in Nova Scotia to Lunenburg, then off to Guelph, ON. Mr. Batt writes that the note would have flown from Toronto to Newcastle-upon-Tyne by air,
