Historic Sites Along The Shore - FRASER'S HOTEL, FOLLY VILLAGE

The Shoreline Journal, in collaboration with the Colchester Historical Society Archives, have inaugurated an ongoing feature utilizing a combination of the digital "A. F. Church Maps" to pin point the circa 1875 location of a Colchester site of historical importance, and connect it to an archival photograph of that site, in that frame.

This hotel, operated in the early years by Charles and Sarah Vance Fraser, was located in the center of the village, near the junction of the "Wallace Road", leading to Folly Lake ,the Wentworth Valley, and on Wallace or

Family oral history relates that Charles Fraser arrived by ship at the port of Folly, or Little Dyke. He was ill and came ashore with only his personal possessions and two parrots. Charles and Sarah operated the hotel until his death in 1851, Sarah took over, and the hotel remained in operation into the early 1900's, under the management of Charles and Sarah's son, John.

The photo is of John Fraser, and other members of the family, taken in front of the hotel. Because of it's location, this hotel

would have been a popular stopping place. In the last half of the 19th century "Folly" had three shipyards operating and in the early part of the 20th century a ferry ran, for twelve years from Little Dyke to Maitland by Mr. Alexander Stewart.
