## Major Forest Fire Averted in Lynn

There are people with three types of jobs, who probably travel our rural roads the most: rural mail driver, delivery personnel and real estate agents. On July 19th she was returning home from meetings in Halifax, and around suppertime noticed a forest file on Lynn and arrived at the scene before the fire equipment and volunteer fighters arrived. Great bunch of crew on the ground and in the air".

The fire was miraculously put out after a few hours of dedicated work by the local Five Island Fire Department, Parrsboro Fire Department , DNR trucks, many volunteers, dozers , backhoes and other large equipment.


