BASS RIVER: All eyes were on Noah Tremblay as he stood among some of his canine heroes, realizing a dream come true. Police service and rescues dogs stood with their handlers beside the Forgotten Heroes Monument Noah designed and brought to reality, quite an accomplishment for a twelve year old.

For the past year, Noah has been raising money to build the unique Forgotten Heroes Monument, in memory of all animals and handlers who served in the Canadian military and police forces. He was able to raise over \$13,000 and on July 1st, before a crowd of more than 200 people, Noah's efforts were applauded as the remarkable monument was unveiled.

Noah arrived at the Forgotten Heroes Ceremony on the back of a motorcycle driven by Wayne Pitman, N.S. Provincial Rep for UN/NATO Veterans Group. Later in the service Mr. Pitman presented him with a framed "Supporter Crest" from the UN/NATO group.

MP Scott Armstrong gave Noah accolades as one of several guest speakers at the Forgotten Heroes Ceremony saying, "Minister of Veterans Affairs Steven Blaney told me

this was absolutely his favourite project in the whole world that he was able to fund or visit," and he went on to say "I believe Noah is the youngest person to ever apply for, work with and achieve an application which was approved by the federal government. This is a great testament to the work he did at 11 and 12 years old."

Tribute and congratulations to Noah were echoed by MLA Karen Casey, Mayor Bob Taylor and Councillor Taggart. Tom approached all levels of government for funding and his request was never turned down. Tom Taggart was amazed at Noah's presentation to County Council and said he couldn't ever remember councillor's unanimously agreeing to hand over money so quickly.

The Forgotten Heroes Monument features the names of Canadian service men and women and their animals engraved on black granite. Stepping stones imprinted with different sets of animal footprints next to human footprints are placed around the base of the monument, along with a large statue of a Newfoundland dog, named Gander, seated on the

Noah was inspired by Gander, a mascot with the Royal Rifles of Canada in WWII, who died when he picked up a grenade thrown Canadian soldiers. Gander's comrades had requested a monument be established to honour animals. "This request at the time was denied and when I found this out, this was when I knew I wanted to help these men honour these animals and make their request come true," said Noah as he spoke at the unveiling ceremony.

A flock of homing pigeons were released as the

monument was unveiled. **RCMP** spokesperson, Constable Brent thanked Noah for remembering the animals and their handlers. Several of the handlers took a moment to pose for a photo with their dogs at the Forgotten Monument.

Noah ended the ceremony by thanking everyone for their support, especially his family, and presenting his mother Sonya Tremblay with basket of flowers.

A reception was held, following the ceremony, at West Consolidated Colchester School.
