The start of The Age of Sail Museum began long before the museum itself was ever a thought. It started in 1989 with a group The Greville Bay Recreation and Development Association and the suggestion of a museum to honour the local heritage of lumbering and shipbuilding. In 1992 the opportunity to obtain the old Methodist Church/Cochrane hall came and the dirty work began. After months of prep, stripping walls and ceilings and then taking apart the building by crane and moving it to the lot of its new home. The majority of the next year was spent raising funds and on Dec 18, 1993 construction began! By June 1994 construction was complete and the interior set to put together. The unofficial opening took place July 27, 1994. The following year saw the official opening.

In 1996 a memorial stone for those lost at sea was dedicated. In 1997 The Porthole Tearoom & gift shop was officially opened and in 1998 the Port Greville Lighthouse was returned by the coastguard to take up permanent resident at the site. In 2000 the Blacksmith shop was reconstructed from an original shop owned by Havelock McCully with a band saw shed attached.

In 2010 a boatshed was built on site and then in 2012 the new Wind and Wave building housing displays, a common meeting room and the research and archive space was opened along with a beautiful wharf walkway and kiosk overlooking the tidal river. An addition was built onto the café and gift shop in 2013 to enlarge and enhance the gift area so souvenir's and local crafts can be showcased From humble beginnings to a tourist destination, The Age of Sail Museum Complex is something we can all be proud of as we celebrate 20 years!

Guests at the celebration will include The Honourable Diane Whalen, Minister of Finance, Scott Armstrong Cumberland, MP, Jaimie Musquodobit Baillie Cumberland South Cumberland County Municipality Warden as well as friends and supporters of the museum and its society. Music will be provided by the Parrsboro Elastic Band and refreshments served.
