Shelley Langille, is celebrating a major milestone this August, a birth-day of sorts. It has been twenty years since she received the gift new kidney, and because of this gift she has been able to enjoy a fulfilling adult life.

Through her teens, and into her twenties, Shelley's kidneys were failing and she wasn't sure she would have a future. Then one day, while in university she received the call that would forever change her life. A donor kidney was available.

The months after the transplant were not without difficulty and there have been some setbacks, but nothing compares to what life would have been without the transplant. "A transplant is not a cure, it is a treatment," says Shelley. "I know this kidney will not last forever but getting a new kidney has been so much better than facing years of dialysis, which is the only other treatment for kidney failure."

Shelley wants to bring attention to the upcoming walk for the Canadian Kidney Foundation being held in Truro. "Give the Gift of Life Walk" will be held on Sept. 13th, leaving from the Prince Street Sobey's location at 9:30AM.

"Family, friends, co-workers and "friendly" pets are all welcome to come out for a fun time. There are many great prizes to be won in support of the many people living with kidney disease," she says. "You can donate online or make a donation that day, or even just come out to show your support by walking or cheering on those who are walking."

proud of the way I am using my second chance at life."



## Historic Sites

### SCHOONER R.N.B. LONDONDERRY


In the last "Shoreline" issue, Ken Kennedy submitted a photo of a schooner, at dockside in Saint John N.B., the name "R.N.B., Londonderry N.S." painted on the transom. He also asked if anyone had any

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information regarding the vessel, and shipbuilding in the Great Village Area.

The vessel was owned by "Robert Noble Berry McLellan". He was a farmer, mill owner and merchant in Great Village and was active from the 1840's until his death in 1886. His farm and mill site is now the farm of Joe Cooper, at the end of Wharf Road, now called "The Mill Farm". His store building, still existing, is the building across from the Legion Hall in Great Village, now occupied by "Instruments Concepts". R.N.B., as he was known, was the grandson of Peter "Pioneer" McLellan, said to be the first English speaking settler to arrive in the area, (about 1762), after the departure of the "Acadians". From the 1870's, Great Village was the official "Port Of Entry" for the township of Londonderry, and had a customs office. In the "Age Of Sail" approximately one hundred large sailing ships, amongst them the "R.N.B.". were built at the Great Village Shipyard, which was situated on the marsh close to the river, off Wharf Road.

It was customary for large merchants of the time to own, or co-own, a vessel, which was used to transport local goods, such as barreled fish, farm produce, and lumber, to markets in the New England States, returning with manufactured goods for the local trade. A quotation from a McLellan family letter in our archives, from R.N.B. to his daughter Malinda says, "The R.N.B. has paid me over one hundred dollars more than she cost me, but has now got dismasted in Apple River, a great squall struck her in the harbour as she was about anchoring, jib gave way and masts fell back". The R. N. B. a small schooner of 57 tons, was built in Great Village in 1869 and her registry was closed out at Halifax in 1885.

On map #302 we have located McLellan's farm and mill, his general store, and the shipyard where the vessel was built.
