

Little Ray's Reptile Show's appearance at the Wentworth Recreation Centre on June 23, 2018, was a fantastic entertaining, educational, environmental, and cultural event. It was entertaining because it was fun to see various reptiles including: red-footed tortoise, lizard, royal python, poison dart frog, leopard gecko, tarantula, Kenyan sand boa, Caiman crocodile, bearded dragon, and Pomegranate (Reteculated Python).

It was educational to see them up close in reality, environmental as seeing them made an important connection on how important it is to have them as part of nature and to care for them, and cultural as touching and stroking them make them very real and partners of us humans. The Head Zookeeper, Shawn Adderley with his skill in displaying them, talking about them, and having us touch them made all of this astounding experience come true. It was one of the best programs I have seen about the importance of respecting these forms of wildlife and how we humans need to care about them.

Shawn Adderley, 26 years of age, was born in Halifax, and has worked as Head Zookeeper with Little Ray's Reptile Zoo in Halifax for five years. Little Ray's Reptile Zoos are the largest exotic pet and Reptile Rescues in Canada and save up to 400 to 800 animals each year. These zoos are also the largest animal education bodies in Canada, travelling coast to coast, teaching children and adults lessons on conservation, positive and responsible pet ownership and respect for wildlife.

Adderley's assistant, Heather Shay loves working with all animals and her favourite animal are kangaroos, which she did not bring with her. She helped

pack up the other animals safely in Halifax in their van heading for Wentworth and this takes a lot of work.

In Wentworth an executive member of the Recreation Centre, Joanne Ferdinand, brought forth the idea of having the Reptile Zoo as a program and all the other volunteer executive and workers agreed.

Joanne gave me added information: "The day was enjoyed by young and all. You could have your face painted, buy a balloon animal, and have lunch at the canteen. Shawn [Adderley] gave a humorous and informative talk to everyone and let anyone who wanted to touch the reptiles. We had about 70 people come out, share the fun, and a great day was had by all."

Joanne's work was



At the entryway, Brenda McLean and President Robert MacLean worked at the door. It was enjoyable and a great time."

I never thought I would touch and stroke a lizard, a tortoise, or a big snake, but I did and this experience made me connect to wildlife and I really appreciated the experience.

Wilsons Security, NS


