New innovation rebates approved

Two business development incentives in the form of an innovation rebate for Van Meekeren Farms Limited and Totally Raw Natural Dog Food Inc have been approved by Nova Scotia Business Inc (NSBI).

Since 1967, Van Meekeren Farms, based in Kings County, has been growing, harvesting, storing and shipping fresh apples to markets throughout Canada, the United States, Europe and more. Van Meekeren Farms is proceeding with a \$8,635,818 capital investment to create an improved apple packing facility and controlled atmosphere storage through an expansion and upgrade to meet the increased demand for export and help increase efficiency and production levels. The company is eligible to earn a maximum innovation rebate of \$2,158,955 upon completion of its project, based on eligible capital spending.

Totally Raw Natural Dog Food Inc., Burnside Business Park, is the largest producer and distributor of high quality, healthy, raw pet meals, treats and supplements in Atlantic Canada. The company exports to more than 500 stores across Canada, including 400 Canadian Tire locations and is working to expand into international markets. Totally Raw Natural Dog Food Inc. is proceeding with a \$2,760,700 capital investment to create a state-of-the-art manufacturing and distribution facility. The new manufacturing and distribution operation will increase efficiency and production and ensure there is capacity to meet the increasing demand for Totally Raw Pet Food products. The company is eligible to earn a maximum innovation rebate of \$322,233 upon completion of its project, based on eligible capital spending of \$1,288,933.

NS Power seeks approval for rate stability

The price Nova Scotians pay for electricity has increased each year by less than inflation since 2014, and Nova Scotia Power is looking to continue that trend for the next three years. Nova Scotia Power has applied to the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board (UARB) to implement a three year fuel stability plan that, if approved, would hold average fuel rate increases for residential customers to 1.5% in 2020, 2021 and 2022. For the average household, this equates to roughly \$2 per month.

New Red Tape Reduction Targets

Government will reduce regulatory burden to business by an additional \$10 million by end of 2020, start an inspection navigator service and expand its work by setting Canada's first target to save people time. Government exceeded its goal of \$25 million in annual savings for businesses, reaching \$34 million by the end of 2018. Changes to restorative justice

Nova Scotians impacted by crime will now have greater access to restorative justice with new protocols that will allow some matters to be referred to restorative justice earlier in the justice process. A provincial moratorium remains in place for the use of restorative justice in offences involving domestic or sexual violence.

Police, Crowns, courts, correctional services, victim services, and the province's eight community justice agencies have all committed to ensuring that referrals to restorative justice are consistently considered and made more frequently. This commitment has been solidified in a five-year memorandum of understanding.

Additional changes include: the establishment of regional lead teams, consisting of senior staff within community restorative justice agencies and senior probation officers. The teams will assess all adult referrals to determine the required supports and expertise needed for each specific case. The establishment of a governance and management committee made up of government, community and justice system leaders. The committee will provide oversight to ensure protocols are being applied and that restorative justice is being used in all appropriate cases. National statistics have shown restorative justice to reduce repeat offences by 12 per cent.

Googoo receives notice of suspension

The Assembly of First Nations has served its regional chief Morley Googoo a notice of suspension. A report indicated he engaged in ongoing discrimination against members of Nova Scotia Native Women's Association and other Mi'kmaq women. The letter, dated Monday and signed by National Chief Perry Bellegrade, gives Googoo 20 days from the date of the letter to respond with written submissions to the assembly's chief executive office. The assembly's move to discipline Googoo stems from findings from an independent report commissioned by the Tripartite Forum. The 2018 report was in response to numerous complaints by Cheryl Maloney, past-president of the Nova Scotia Native Women's Association. The report showed, among other things, that Googoo attempted to eliminate Maloney's position and remove the women's association from the Tripartite Forum, a federal, provincial and Mi'kmaq government organization. It also stated that Googoo acted in an aggressive and intimidating manner toward women in the organization, causing some of them to fear for their jobs.
