Cumberland-Colchester Internet Provider

Xplornet Communications Inc., the ISP provider, chosen by Cumberland and Colchester to be the lead on a \$60+ Million broadband construction is Canada's largest rural-focused broadband service provider. Xplornet has announced the purchase of 3500 MHz spectrum in 99 licence areas that will enable the company to continue to innovate and deliver fast, reliable and affordable unlimited broadband service to rural Canadians. The mid-band spectrum covers Xplornet's rural service areas in all provinces and was acquired for \$244 million, representing Xplornet's largest spectrum investment to date. The 3500 MHz spectrum is ideal for 5G wireless deployment. Xplornet intends to use this spectrum to unlock the potential of 5G technology across rural Canada with the roll out of its 5G wireless service starting in fall 2021.

with disabilities and those needing enhanced or individual supports, and ensures all families have equitable access to high quality, affordable child care.

On July 13th the Government of Canada also announced funding of \$58 million over the next four years for the 2021-25 Canada-Nova Scotia Early Learning and Child Care Extension Agreement to continue initiatives funded in the previous 2020-21 agreement, as well as to invest in infant care and an accelerated early childhood diploma program, and \$10.9 million in 2021-22 for Nova Scotia to support the recruitment and retention of an early childhood workforce.

The time for a Canada-wide early learning and child care system is now. Last week, the governments of Canada and British Columbia took a significant step toward making this system a reality by signing a historic early learning and child care agreement. The Government of Canada will continue to work with provinces, territories, and Indigenous partners across the country to make life easier and more affordable for families, help parents – especially mothers – return to the workforce, and give children across the country an equal chance to succeed.

Article in Local Newspaper on May 12th, 1941

- MARCHING FROM AMHERST TO DEBERT -

Battalion Moving Today In Battle Formation

- FAREWELL GIVEN N.S.S.H BY TOWN -

AMHERST, MAY 12 - Believed to be the first such mass movement of troops in this province in more than a century, the North Nova Scotia Highlanders, who have been here for 18 months, are scheduled to leave at 5:30 a.m. tomorrow morning for Debert, covering the 95 miles by foot and motor as if in actual warfare with full equipment, guns and ammunition.

Provide Convoy

Escorted by an Army Service Corps convoy of motorcycles, with scouts and rear guards, the battalion will move in battle formation. The men will bivouac Tuesday night in the vicinity of Five Islands, moving cross country via Lynn Mountain Road from Springhill to Five Islands. They are scheduled to arrive in Debert Wednesday and will be greeted by Brigadier Eric Haldenby.

Starting out the battalion will move partly by bus and partly on foot, alternating along the line of march for short distances in a "ride and tie" sequence.

Here this afternoon with hundreds of citizens from town and country lining the streets, and with more than hundreds of school children carrying flags, and all the business places decked with patriotic decorations, the North Nova Scotia Highlanders expressed appreciation of hospitality of the town in a brilliant "march Past". The parade was under the direction of Lieut. Col. H. W. Murdock, and the salute was taken by Mayor W.J. Kaufman, who was flanked on either side by members of the Town Council, their wives, and by heads of various service organizations. An address was read by His Worship praising the Highlanders for their good conduct while in town, bringing forth a suitable response from the commanding officer. Each member of the unit was presented with a card containing the following inscription:

"The mayor and corporation on behalf of the people of Amherst take this opportunity to bid you farewell. During your stay here you have conducted yourselves in a manner worthy of the highest tradition of the uniform you wear and have endeared yourselves to all of us. As you go forth to render your services to your King, your empire and civilization, our best wishes will follow you and we shall look forward to that day when returning to us after glorious victory, we may extend to you a glad welcome."

* * *

Hearty cheers were given by the Highlanders as well as by the citizens. Later in the day, the officers were entertained by Mayor M.J. Kaufman at the Marshlands Club where President J.D. Collins as chairman addresses were given by N.S. Sanford, H.D. Biden, Warden C.J. Fletcher and K.J. Cochran, ex-M.P.A. toast was extended by the officers to Mayor Kaufman for his hospitality and expressions of goodwill.
