RE: **Environmental Assessment** - OSCO Aggregates Limited, Pit No. 4 Extension Project, Glenholme, Colchester County, Nova Scotia
The assessment of the proposed Pit No. 4 Extension Project in Colchester County, Nova Scotia has been completed. This letter is to advise that I have approved the above project in accordance with Section 40 of the Nova Scotia Environment Act, S.N.S., 1994-95 and subsection 13(1)(b) of the Environmental Assessment Regulations, N.S. Reg. 348/2022, made under the Act.

Following a review of the information provided by OSCO Aggregates Limited, and the information provided by the Mi'kmaq of Nova Scotia, and the public during consultation on the environmental assessment, I am satisfied that any adverse effects or significant environmental effects of the undertaking can be adequately mitigated through compliance with the attached terms and conditions and through subsequent approvals.

Please be advised that prior to the alteration of applicable wetlands identified in the Study Area, you will be required to apply for and receive the required Wetland Alteration Approval(s) from the Department. Please be advised that if operations require the withdrawal of surface or groundwater at rates exceeding the 23,000 litres/day, you will also be required to apply for and receive a Water Withdrawal Approval from the Department.

Decisions regarding such approvals will be made based on the information provided at the time of application while applying the Environment Act and relevant regulations. For questions related to any wetland alterations or water withdrawal, please contact Lynda Weatherby, Business Relationship Manager, at (902) 717-3170 or via email at lynda.weatherby@novascotia.ca

In your Environmental Assessment Registration Document, you identified Species at Risk and/or their habitat within the Study Area. It is important that you work with the Department of Natural Resources and Renewables to address or mitigate impacts such that your project meets requirements under provincial and federal legislation related to Species at Risk.

Please note that as part of the Part V application to amend the current Industrial Approval, you will be required to submit an updated progressive rehabilitation plan for the Project site. It will be important that you work with Nova Scotia Environment and Climate Change to identify areas under the current Industrial Approval that are no longer active and to undertake reclamation activities.

Dear Honourable Member,

I am writing today to express my concerns regarding the proposed expansion of Pit #4 planned by OSCO Aggregates LTD. in Little Dyke, Nova Scotia. Over the past several months I have been in communication with the Little Dyke Community Coalition regarding their concerns of this potential extension: traffic safety; noise pollution; Crystalline Silica dust just to name a few. This community driven group has put in countless hours of research and effort to educate themselves and the people around them, including myself, on the potential hazards that this expansion could present.

I believe that provincial regulations have not kept up with the technology that crushing operations have access to decades later. We have a duty to the residents of Nova Scotia to protect where they live. Further consideration to current regulatory enforcement and the environmental assessment process should be carefully examined in this matter. The 30 day public submissions timeline is not adequate enough for capturing all of the pertinent information. Mitigating the potential health risks that this proposed expansion may cause is paramount to protect the community of Little Dyke and should be included in regulations moving forward.

Development is necessary. The extraction of gravel is a key component in supporting our public works infrastructure and roads. I understand this and agree, but I do not believe that it should be at the potential detriment of the residents in our communities. Business, whatever it may be, should never be at a cost to its neighbours.

I am aware of two other letters that have been sent to you by the mayor and my colleagues from the county of Colchester. I agree with both of those submissions as well.
