Over 250 attend Nov 11th service in Bass River

11 am on November 11th again brought the Veterans Memorial Park to silence, if only for a short while. Led by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, veterans from various organizations marched to the gardens with pride, and joined more then 250 others to express their thanks to all those who have done so much for our country.

Shortly before the hour, church bells rang for one minute as they had done in London's town square on this day in 1918. The war was finally over. Ms. Anne Knight Gorman of the Nova Scotia Last Post fund addressed the guests, telling of their lasting support for all veterans, until the very end.

She spoke of remembrance and the 10 names they have supported on the center stone, Supreme Sacrifice. All these men hail from Nova Scotia, all have lost their lives while serving in Afghanistan.

The Veterans Memorial Park grows 10 Royal Red Maples for each of these soldiers, now a place where family members can sit and remember. Thousands of people have visited the park over the season.

Following the wreath laying ceremony, all guests were invited to the WCCS for a full reception

put on by the students and staff at the school. All and all it was a huge success, and we thank all veterans from all areas of the military for taking part with us.


