## **Historic Sites ALONG THE SHORE - Blacksmith Shop in Five Islands**

The Shoreline Journal, in collaboration with the Colchester Historical Society Archives, have inaugurated an ongoing feature utilizing a combination of the digital "A. F. Church Maps" to pin point the circa 1875 location of a Colchester site of historical importance, and connect it to an archival photograph of that site, in that frame.

The arrow pointer on map # 318 picks out the approximate spot where this photo of Andrew Patterson's blacksmith shop was located in Five Islands in the early 20th century. In the background is the spire of the Presbyterian, (now United) Church. The shop was started in 1887.

As can be seen in the photo, he did not just shoe horses and oxen and produce custom orders, he produced, for the general market place, quantities of farm required products, such as wiffle trees,

peavy stocks, sled runners, axe handles, neck yokes, box sleds. He sold these products in the Cumberland and Colchester county towns and villages within wagon distance of Five Islands.

The wood components of his products would have come from the Cobequid Hills behind the village, and the iron components and horse shoes would have come by wagon from Parrsboro. Most of the villages up and down the Cobequid shore had at least one, and sometimes several, blacksmith shops, catering to the farming, lum-

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bering and ship building trades, but very few shops produced items in quantity, to be purchased "off the shelf". An interesting side note to the story, one of Patterson's apprentices in 1898 was "Mate Fisher", who a few years later had a blacksmith shop in Great Village, and was mentioned in Elizabeth Bishop's short story

"In The Village".
