Wade says he has been an avid runner for about the last 4 ½ years but started training seriously for the run back in June. He would run 10-15 km about 4 or 5 days a week, making sure he didn't put too much stress on his knees or ankles.

The route was an ambitious task with Economy Mountain to climb. Wade says the first 30 kilometers went smoothly but it got a bit rough at about Central Economy. "It doesn't seem it when you are driving, but the road is a lot hillier along there then it looks. There were 4 or 5 substantial up hill and down areas before the last big one, Economy Mountain, and I started to cramp up."

Dave Yorke accompanied Wade along the route in a support vehicle and has nothing but high praise for his accomplishment. "Wade is a true athlete. He ran all 50k, without stopping to rest or even walk,"

says Dave. "I tried to be there for Wade, but at the same time keep out of sight and out of his mind. I didn't want to put any pressure on him." He carried a supply of sports drinks, energy gels, water and a change of foot ware in the van.

Dave says he felt very honoured to be a part of the run. "People might not realize how far it really is from Glenholme to Five Islands and to travel the whole distance without any stops, well, that is amazing!"

Supporters came out all along the route to cheer Wade on, and many passed along a donation. Most were surprised at how fast he was travelling.

The run's progress was updated on the Rink's facebook page, with people making comments like "Dave just called and he is now in Portapique!," posted at 9:30AM. Communities of Bass River, Economy, Carrs Brook were mentioned as he kept up the pace.

Excitement grew as he neared the community of Five Islands and Wade's brother Grant joined him for a portion of the run. At the finish line, a fire truck and over 50 friends and family gathered and cheered as he finished the run.

Wade expected the run might take 7 hours, but was hoping to finish in less than 6 hrs. He was very pleased when he crossed the finish line in only 5 hours and 22 minutes.

It has been a few years since Wade has played hockey but he says he is looking forward to lacing up his skates this winter.

Is he making plans for another run? "Absolutely." he says we great enthusiasm. "I will do another 50k run in mid-October 2013. This time I am hoping for company all along the route. People can set their own personal goals and whether they join in for 1km or all 50km, it will be a lot of
