


Local 4-H Member Wins National Bursary

Marla McNutt, Lower Truro was awarded the Jack Pemberton Youth Development Bursary through The Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in partnership with 4-H Canada. This \$2500 bursary is for a senior 4-H Member residing outside of the province of Ontario, with a keen interest in agriculture and a desire to attend the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair (RAWF).

On Saturday, November 8, Marla and her mother, Teresa, flew to Toronto for the Fair. They were greeted by Peter Hohendel, the Director of the RAWF, who acted as their host. After a tour of the grounds they were on their own to explore the 1,000,000 sq ft of ground. They had the opportunity to meet up with 4-H Canada representatives and some of the members of the 4-H Members Conference who were also in Toronto and attending the Fair. A luncheon was held at the Royal Court restaurant for Marla to meet Mr. Pemberton, also in attendance was Valerie Person from 4-H Canada.

Jack Pemberton is a past president of The Royal Agricultural Winter Fair and a continued supporter of the

Royal Horse Show and the Royal Jams, Jellies and Pickles Competition. Mr. Pemberton is happy to extend the opportunity, to travel to Toronto and see the Royal, to a 4-H member as he feels The Royal is a wonderful experience for anyone who is interested in agriculture.

That afternoon Mr. Hohendel's daughter, Annie escorted Marla and her mother to the Ripley's Aquarium and a trip up the CN Tower. The Royal provided accommodations at the Westin Harbour with a view of Lake Ontario.

On Sunday, Marla presented ribbons to two classes of the Clydesdale competitions. That afternoon they were provided tickets to see the Rodeo which included seeing bare-back bronc and saddle bronc riding, poles, barrel racing, and bull riding; as well as performances from trick riders and Guy MacLean. The Royal Dairy Classic was that evening and continued on Monday where they were able to watch the eight dairy members from Nova Scotia compete.

Overall, it was an amazing experience that Marla will always remember.

Builder: Davie Shipbuilding & Repairing Co. Ltd., Lauzon, Que.
 Launched June 5, 1942.
 Commissioned August 27, 1942 at Quebec City.
 Wartime career: Arrived at Halifax on September 15 and was allocated to WLEF, becoming a member of its EG W-4 in June 1943. Transferred to Sydney Force in May 1944 and, except for a short stint with Halifax Force, remained based on Sydney until the end of the European war. She was paid off July 31, 1945.
 Fate: Turned over in 1945 to the marine section of the RCMP and renamed Herchmer. Sold in 1947 for commercial use and renamed Gulf Mariner. Abandoned ashore in the Fraser River after plans to convert her to a suction dredge failed to materialize. Broken up in 1964.

Armstrong, who is Casey's former campaign manager, said in a statement Tuesday that he is disappointed with his one-time boss's decision to run for the Liberals. Armstrong's career in Ottawa has been fast tracked with his rise to be appointed as Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Employment and Social Development,

Jason Kenny. On November 11th Armstrong flew to Ottawa to be part of Canada's delegation to the G-20 Summit in Australia, after being invited by Prime Minister Stephen Harper on Sunday, November 9th.

In another development, Scott Lockhart — the president of the Cumberland-Colchester Conservative riding association — resigned his position on Wednesday,

November 19th to back Casey in his bid to return to the House of Commons.
