

## Cumberland County Seniors AT SHINIMICAS

It is always a pleasure for the senior clubs to meet in Shinimicas where a phased out rural school building came up for sale at \$1 and was bought by the Sunrise Senior Citizens' Northport club as a place for the Northport senior club to meet. Coming from the Wentworth Pioneer Club, three of us enjoyed the drive over as we saw some of the best scenery in Cumberland County.

Shinimicas is the Mik'maq name for "Shining River" and we did pass over a river with shining waters in the sunlight at Shinimicas Bridge on our way to Lower Shinimicas.

The nine senior Cumberland County clubs were called to a meeting by the Cumberland County Seniors' Council which has four meetings annually in order to inform the Cumberland clubs of the activities and concerns in this county and also to give pertinent information about the other 151 senior clubs in Nova Scotia, all under the direction of the Nova Scotia Department of Seniors.

The Northport Club is renovated from a school building to a comfortable and well designed hall. At 11am the meeting was opened by Council President Judy Schultz welcoming everyone present and introducing Kelly Milner who spoke and showed a video about Your Way to Wellness program, a free six week program, each session two and a half hours long, with how to live wall with chronic illness.

The Wentworth Recreation Centre sponsored the program from September 17 to October 22. Milner also mentioned the importance of phone 211 which helps callers to find the right community and social services, and dial 811 for health link & health info from a registered nurse. Also, a one-page pamphlet is available called the Tree for Seniors with 14 headings listed with all the services listed below. Next on stage was Dawn Lewis who is from Port Howe and has a beautiful expressive singing voice. Dawn says, "Singing is such a joy to me, and it's a good pastime. I practice one hour a day to keep my voice in tune as it is such a gift and such fun." Dawn Lewis sings at church services, including weddings and funerals, and at other community affairs.

A lunch consisting of casseroles, ham, tomatoes, lettuce, cucumbers, cheese, a

dessert of carrot cake, and drinks was served by the Northport club members. The business meeting began with the executive at the head table. President Judy Schultz gave out the latest information on: Seniors Safety Grant, Alzheimer Family Caregiver Education Series, Dementia Strategy Consultations, Dental Plan, and Older Driver Program.

Most senior clubs in the province belong to the Federation of Senior Citizens and Pensioners of Nova Scotia. The Federation votes on the resolutions of concern from the senior clubs of Nova Scotia at its annual Convention in Truro and the resolutions for either provincial or federal governments are presented to the proper authorities. Now is the time for the Cumberland clubs to send in their resolutions to the Federation Secretary, Virginia Crane, 126 Apple Cross Drive, Sydney, Nova Scotia. There will no longer be last minute resolutions considered at the Federation's Convention.

Schultz asked for a decision concerning payments presently made between Cumberland Council and the Cumberland clubs. A motion was made and passed to keep the payments the same as now done.

The clubs present each gave a report on their present activities which, as usual, included various games, lunches, suppers, fund-raising and charity donations. Arnold Smith who attends the monthly meetings of the Cumberland Aging Well Network in Amherst reported on its activities.

The next meeting will be in Oxford on Wednesday, November 19, 2014 from 11am to 3pm with the Oxford Pioneer Heritage Club acting as host.
