Jed Ritcey Fund to Distribute \$6,10000

The Board of Directors of the Jed Ritcey Legacy Fund have announced they are \$6100.00 from the fund to grassroots program development and equipment support to the three minor hockey associations in Colchester County who submitted requests in 2019.

The World Junior A Challenge (WJAC), hosted in Truro at the Rath Eastlink Community Centre from December 10 - 16,2017 acted as the catalyst for the establishment of the 'Jed Ritcey Legacy Fund' (JRLF), committing profits to going back into the community through grassroots prodevelopment, gram equipment, facility upgrades and future event hosting in Colchester County- to continue to build regional capacity to grow the sport of hockey.

It is estimated the event had a net economic impact of \$1.9 million in the Country. Of that, \$1.7 million directly impacted the Province of Nova Scotia, with \$1.5 million in the Truro/Colchester Region alone.

The fund was developed in memory of Colchester Sports Hall of Famer and community leader Jed Ritcey. His long-term service and contribution to Hockey Canada, Hockey Nova Scotia, the Maritime Junior Hockey League and Truro Minor Hockey. The Truro resident always believed in the importance of giving back to his

community.

Dave Ritcey, Jed's son, was Chair of the 2017 WJAC Host Organizing Committee and is a member of the JRLF Board member said, "We are pleased to share again this year in 2019 with local minor hockey associations from the funds raised through the World Junior A Challenge event in December 2017"

Applications for funding were made available to the local minor hockey associations with specific criteria in late August. There were three applications received by the board at the deadline.

The associations that will benefit from this year's funding are the Truro Minor Hockey Association, South Colchester Minor Hockey Association and the Tatamagouche Minor Hockey Association.

The dance happened before the Fire Department and others celebrated on October 31.


