Is Rural Canada Becoming Irrelevant?

This is the time of year when I would typically be in Ottawa for Federation of Canadian Municipalities meetings. November meeting has always been four days of meeting MP's and doing Advocacy work and promoting Municipal policy interests that has been developed / debated over the past year.

Clearly it is very different this year. We have had online speeches from MP's representing different parties. It does sound like most are anticipating an election in the spring, but that is anyone's guess. We have discussed a recent \$750,000,000 program announcement for Broadband in Rural Canada. The stated goal is to insure 98% of Canadians received the service by 2026.

I guess, this is a good time to state how disappointing this week has been for me. There is an ever widening gap between assistance and concern for rural Canada and the big cities. Broadband connectivity is critical for many rural communities across Canada. Seven hundred fifty million dollars may seem like a tremendous amount of money. It is a drop in the bucket and woefully inadequate. This money was identified as a top-up to the one billion announced for Universal Broadband fund announced in 2019.

To give a bit of context, the Cumberland/ Colchester internet project, two small Municipalities in Nova Scotia, cost 64 million. We applied for Federal funding from the \$1-Billion fund, but were advised it was all used up.

Meanwhile billions and billions, I believe in excess of \$4-Billion has been given to big cities to pay operating losses for transit systems as a result of reduced ridership during Covid. There is no doubt CoVid is a challenge and I do not want to downplay its role or cost to our Government.

Another policy announcement that was discussed this week was affordable housing. Our Government, I believe in September announced \$1-Billion for much needed affordable housing. I can tell you when you sit in these Zoom meetings with Municipal leaders from across Canada and listen to the challenges the cities are facing it is truly scary. The situation with homelessness and housing is for me, incomprehensible so there is no question this is a valuable much needed program.

Additional discussions were held with respect to green energy and what is becoming the new catch phrase "energy poverty". The Federal Government has added \$300-Million to the FCM Green Municipal fund that is to be made available thru Municipalities to assist in retrofitting homes to make them more energy efficient with the two fold goal of reducing energy consumption and leaving more money in citizens pocket for other critical household needs such as food. Great

program. Unfortunately when I asked how to access this fund, I was advised it was being mostly targeted to those with a documented history of the greatest need.

Guess where that is! I want to go back to this new buzz word "energy poverty". You don't spend much time talking about this before someone comments "the best way to reduce energy poverty in housing is to focus on the urban centers".

They comment, the older homes in rural communities are typically single family very energy inefficient and then they move on to "plus the gasoline that is used as these rural resident commute to the urban centers is a large contributor to the carbon problem". Hence build the affordable housing in the urban centers. How has that worked out during CoVid with mostly the more vulnerable in our society clustered in the urban core???

I truly do apologize for turning this article into a rant. Being a Board member at the Federal Municipal level and having spent six years learning understanding and being in a position to understand, to some degree Federal Government policy as well as the advocacy that helps formulate that policy, I am becoming jaded/ alarmed. Rural Canada is fast becoming irrelevant in this country.

For the record, I am not laying this all at the feet of the current Federal Government. This week we have had speeches and discussions with members of opposition parties as well, and every second word is cities!, (that's where the votes are). Organizations like the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, considered the strongest advocacy group in Canada bear some of this responsibility as well.
