encourage the surviving children to pursue a higher education. 100% of funds raised will go toward educational scholarships facilitated by the Nova Scotia Legacy Society and community programs funded by Portauquique Community Build Up.

On Friday, Nov. 6th the Wagon Walk left Wentworth Community Centre at 8AM heading towards Debert under overcast skies but surprisingly warm temperatures. Nick Beaten, along with his son Dax, were waiting for the Wagon Walkers at about 5:30PM as they arrived at the memorial for his wife Kristen Beaton on Plains Rd., Debert. "I can't believe the weather they are having for November," he said adding, "I think they have 23 souls making this happen for them."

Nick was very appreciative for what Adrian and Ireland were doing. "I hope in 10 years it will be the good things like this people remember. This shows all the good that has come from our community and beyond."

There was also a stop at the memorial for Heather O'Brien on Plains Road and District 9 Councillor Marie Benoit was on hand to accept the tulip bulbs in honour of Heather, Kristen and baby Beaton.

Onslow Belmont Fire Chief Greg Muise drove a fire truck behind the pair as they walked along Plains Road as dusk rolled into darkness, providing

much needed support lighting along the busy road. Deputy Chief Darrell Currie joined in the walk from Plains Road to the fire hall in Lower Onslow. Adrian and Ireland had a hot meal and spent the night at the fire hall.

When Adrian was asked why he chose a gruelling 150km walk to raise awareness he says he believes one can get a truer education chasing discomfort and following intrigue. "I have found it difficult to study just using online learning through Covid. I am learning so much doing this walk." When asked if they were getting tired walking, Ireland remarked they were too excited with the experiences and meeting people to be tired.

The Wagon Walk route on Saturday, Nov. 7th continued through Truro and Brookfield, with an overnight at the Stewiacke Fire Hall. On Nov. 8th, the walk continued through Shubenacadie, Milford and ended at the RCMP head quarters in Enfield.

Legislature to be Prorogued December 18

The second session of the sixty-third general assembly will be prorogued at 9 a.m. on Friday, Dec. 18. The third session of the sixty-third general assembly will open at 1 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 16, 2021, with the lieutenant governor reading the speech from the throne for the new premier who will be selected from three candidates vying for Premier McNeil's job, upon his retirement.

It is necessary to prorogue the existing session to open a new session of the general assembly.

Pharmacy Technicians to Administer Vaccines

Pharmacy technicians across Nova Scotia are now able to administer injections offered in the province's 310 pharmacies, including flu shots and other vaccines. This makes Nova Scotia the first province in Canada to make full use of all regulated pharmacy practitioners in the administration of vaccines.

This change is the outcome of work the Nova Scotia College of Pharmacists (NSCP) began in 2018 and comes during a year where demand for vaccines - particularly flu shots - is significantly higher than normal. With over 250 registered pharmacy technicians in Nova Scotia, this represents a substantial increase in the number of practitioners able to meet this demand. This expansion of technicians' scope of practice means they will also be able to support a future COVID-19 vaccination campaign for Nova Scotians.

Pharmacy technicians are regulated healthcare providers who are trained in the technical aspects of preparing and dispensing prescriptions. Technicians administering vaccines will have completed an accredited injection training program and will work in partnership with a pharmacist. By taking this team-based approach, pharmacies will be better able to meet the healthcare needs of Nova Scotians.

The NSCP encourages individuals to check with their pharmacy by calling or visiting their website to learn how they can be immunized or receive other healthcare services. This will help to avoid crowding in the pharmacy, keeping them a safe space for the public.
