Scotia Pool to get Municipal Budgeted Funds

Three items were on the agenda at Colchester Municipal Council's presentation session held in council chambers on January 20th. First on the agenda was a presentation from Ms. Bower, Scotia Pool Society. She reported the society has negotiated a long term lease with the Province of Nova Scotia for the facility in Bible Hill; improved its financial position and plan improvements to the heating system to significantly reduce costs. Municipal Councillors agreed to release the budgeted \$50,000 grant. The matter will be finalized at the council meeting on January 29th.

The Society's request for a \$100,000 operational grant and a further \$25,000 for its capital budget in the next fiscal year was handled with two motions being forwarded to the budgeting process.

With many supportive members in the audience, Chamber of Commerce president, Stephanie Jones outlined the chamber's plan to create "Greater Colchester Partnership, an economic development initiative for all of Colchester County, including Stewiacke, Millbrook and Truro. During the presentation, Jones said Municipal Council was last of the presentations to municipal governments and the other three municipalities were onside.

Both Truro and Colchester have been asked to also contribute the salary and benefits of their individual economic development officers, who would be the loaned to the partnership answering to an Executive Director.

Mayor Taylor expressed hesitation on the partnership stated, "Not in favour of developing another bureaucracy", while Councillor Blair said economic development needs to be business driven and if all are in that's the way to go.

Taggart agreed he likes the idea of business putting some skin in the game, and it has to be business led. He expressed concern that if Colchester is putting in half of the funding from the municipalities perhaps

Primary Registration for 2015-2016

Grade Primary registration for the 2015-2016 school year takes place from January to March. Registration is open to children age five, on or before December 31, 2015. Parents/guardians are required to contact their local elementary school to arrange an appointment to register their child.

The registration process takes about 30 minutes. Parents/guardians **must** accompany their child to the registration and bring their child's:

- Birth certificate (proof of age)
- Provincial health card
- Immunization records



"TRURO QUEEN"

In the June, 2012 issue we featured in this



page, the story of Capt. Jonathan Borden (Bird) Marsh, master mariner, of Economy, Colchester County, which we will reprint here. In 1912 he retired from the sea, but in 1918 he was persuaded to take command of the Economy build "Truro Queen", shown here in a recently acquired Archives photograph, showing the vessel under construction on the shoreline at Economy. Her first cargo was a load of lumber, from Saint John, N.B. to Buenos Aires, Argentina. The vessel left Saint John on Dec. 7th, 1918, and arrived at her destination on Feb. 6th, 1919, a distance of 4000 miles. The photo shows a little girl in the foreground (and inset), can anyone identify her?

The arrow pointer on map # 311 locates what was, in 1876 the home of Captain Jonathan Borden Marsh. Captain "Bird" Marsh was one of the most illustrious sea captains on the Cobequid Shore. A few years before this map was made, in the early 1870's Captain Marsh transported the famous "Stanley" expedition to Zanzibar, on the east coast of Africa, where newspaperman Stanley went in search of the famous "Dr. Livingston". When he found him, the only white man in the African jungle for miles around, Stanley created the famous quotation, "Dr. Livingston, I presume?" Marsh's sailing career began in the 1860's, sailing mostly Cobequid Bay vessels, one of which, the "Cleo", a Great Village vessel, was written about by Archibald MacMechan in his book "There Goes the Ships". In 1900 Marsh and his family were at Tagish, in the Yukon Territories, and Marsh was piloting steamboats on the Yukon River, part of the Yukon Gold Rush. He retired from the sea in 1912, but in 1918, at the age of seventy nine, he came out of retirement to take command of the Economy built

"Truro Queen". Retiring again in 1920, he lived in Economy until his death in 1934. His home, pictured here as it was during his lifetime, has been lovingly restored and maintained by the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Burchell Fulmore.
