## Bradeans' Machining Even More Competitive

Bradeans Tool & Die of Amherst continues to invest in new technology to better serve their aerospace clients. The company's latest investment is an Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system. The Honourable Rob Moore, Minister of State (ACOA), and Parliamentary Secretary Scott Armstrong announced Government of Canada support on Monday, January 19th.

The Government of Canada is providing a repayable contribution of \$63,360 toward the

project, through ACOA's Business Development Program (BDP). In 2013, ACOA provided a \$223,000 repayable contribution toward the addition of two five-axis vertical milling centers with a robotic tender. These machines produce highly complex parts with intricate shapes and have enabled Bradeans to create new types of components with great efficiency.

Armed with the new technology, Bradeans' machining capability is now one of the most advanced in the industry.

## Lost Water Nearly Triple Canadian Average

Nova Scotians are using a lot more water than their counterparts across Canada. The Ecology Action Centre released a report on January 14th describing water consumption, water leakage, and energy use at water utilities calculates water consumptions range from 151 m<sup>3</sup> to 338 m<sup>3</sup> while the national average is 99 m<sup>3</sup> per person per year.

The report also revealed lost water from leaking pipes and other infrastructure repre-

sents up to 41% of total water in some communities, nearly triple the national average of 15%."

To allow communities to save water, energy and money, the report lists seven recommendations for water leaders at the municipal level, starting with the expansion of water metering into more communities.
