The Honourable Keith Colwell was a guest speaker at the 18th Annual DFNS Banquet and Awards evening on January 16th at the Best Western Glengarry, Truro. The NS Minister of Agriculture offered words of support to the industry, recognizing the tough year producers have faced with the Canada, US, Mexico Trade Agreement causing serious concern for the industry, along with additional access to Canadian markets by foreign dairy

producers, limits on exports and the removal of class 7.

He said the Department is working hard, with a very strong voice in Ottawa, to get these things changed and offers his full support of supply management the way it was. On the positive side he mentioned the growth of markets, new young farmers getting into the industry and the fact Canada has one of the most efficient dairy operations in the world.

The Minister presented a

10 Year DFNS Milestone Excellence Award to James H. Lamb Farms Limited, along with a 5 Year Award to Fort Lands Farm Limited. ## This Thief Steals a Little from You Each Day

A retiring director with DFNS made a very emotional and heartfelt speech at the Annual DFNS Banquet. His words took an immense amount of courage to say in front of a room full of his peers. The message was powerful and worth sharing.

After nine years, and despite accolades from fellow Board members, he told fellow dairy producers he felt he hadn't been the Board member he should have been.

"It wasn't the only thing where I wasn't able to be all I should have been. I probably wasn't the friend I should have been, I probably wasn't the father or the husband or even the farmer that I should have been," he spoke with a shaky voice as he revealed the reason why he couldn't be his best at all things.

"I had a companion, not a friend, but a thief...and he stole a little bit from me each day and I didn't know this was taking place." He then asked if anyone in the room knew what he was talking about adding, "No one is going to yell it out, because no one really wants to talk about it."

"The thief was DEPRESSION, and I have never really said this word out loud to anyone but my closest friends."

Looking back, he could see he had been dealing with depression for the past ten years. He compared these years to watching a child grow but in reverse. "You don't grow and gain like a child does, you shrink and you lose, and you don't notice it until something happens."

There are a number of symptoms he experienced, including lack of focus and lack of short-term memory which he says made being on the Board difficult. He found it was easier to not say anything at meetings, "as

you have no idea what they have been talking about and you might say something embarrassing."

Dealing with a whole range of emotions is another symptom hard to deal with every day. He found himself using anger to cover up emotions he didn't want to surface.

"The number one reason people leave our industry as dairy producers is mental health and it is a very serious thing that is taking place. There is a stigma around mental health and depression, and I know this because I was that guy." He went on to say he was that guy who said, "I need to suck it up, get over it, move on." This is why he feels it took so long to realize he had a real problem and get help.

He eventually realized he didn't have the skills to deal with everything that was going on and finally decided to reach out for help. The symptoms of depression include pessimism, irritability, restlessness, loss of interest, fatigue, and often sadness. He was thankful he never had suicidal thoughts or actions, which is another symptom.

Even after a psychologist told him he had severe depression, he couldn't really accept it. It took an accident on the way home and an hour waiting for a tow truck, to give his situation personal reflection and the realization he was actually suffering from depression.

He says the statistical rate of depression in male farmers is 4 times the national rate and he feels this has something to do with the way they have been raised, growing up farms where everyone worked hard and learned to "suck it up" when things got bad. He feels men are particularly vulnerable because of the
