The trees are staffed by a group of dedicated volunteers. At the Masstown Market, the Angels Remembered Tree, is located right inside the main entrance. Volunteers Meredith Lewis and Judy Lewis were just starting to set up their stawhen visitors tion. approached and wanted to give donations to this worthy cause. This is the 4th year an Angels Remembered Tree has been located at the Masstown Market.

The donations collected at the Angels Remembered Trees are used to support Hospice programs right here in Colchester County.The Colchester East Hants Hospice Society provides care and support to families facing end of life, through programs such as Volunteer Visiting, Food from the Heart, Practical Support, Hospice Wishes and Grief Support Services. They support the work of the District Palliative Care Program and are often alerted to special needs of individual families through the Palliative Care Program.
