Are your parents aging?

Prepare for an emergency by gathering the information you might need should your parent be hurt and unable to respond to doctors' questions. If your aging parents were to have a medical emergency, could you provide the information doctors would need to care for them? Do you know the names of your aging parents' doctors? Is your mom taking any medications? Has your dad ever had any surgery?

While you might not know the answers to some of these questions about your aging parents, it only takes a few

minutes to collect and write down this vital information. And it can save precious time in an emergency. Here is a list of 10 things you need to know about your aging parents' health: 1) Names of their doctors. 2) Birth dates. 3) List of allergies. 4) Advance directives - a legal document that outlines a person's decisions about his or her health care, such as whether or not resuscitation efforts should be made and the use of life-support machines. 5) Major medical problems, such as diabetes or heart disease. 6) List of medications and supplements - don't forget vitamins, aspirin, etc. 7) Religious beliefs. 8) Insurance information. 9) Prior surgeries and major medical procedures. 10) Lifestyle information – do your parents drink alcohol or use tobacco?

Knowing these 10 things should help you take care of your parents in an emergency. You can also have them put ICE into their cell phones with your name and phone number in their directory.

Paramedics check cell phones now to check for an ICE - in case of emergency - number and will call you if they need to. These few easy steps could mean the difference between life and death. Be sure, be safe!
