2nd World Record Attempt for Carolann Naugle

Completing the world's largest wreath was not enough of an accomplishment for Carolann Naugle of Valley. In November she set out to establish a new world record, this time for the world's largest natural garland.

Two years ago, Carolann completed a 251 foot, nine inch Christmas wreath at a farm in Belmont. She later received official documentation from the Guinness Book of World Records establishing the wreath as a world record.

Carolann knew as soon as she finished the wreath in May, 2008 there would be another record attempt. "About a day after I finished I knew I wanted to try for the world's largest garland. I thought the Christmas Tree industry needed a pickup me up, to draw attention to the industry this time of year." she says.

Carolann worked on the garland approximately 60 hours per week for four weeks, most of the time she worked alone. "I enjoy working in the woods and when the weather was good it was actually fun making the garland. I guess people might find that strange," she laughs.

There were a few setbacks along the way including wet weather, problems with the machinery and the loss of some of her brush. "Someone actually stole a whole pile of brush I had cut," says Carolann, "But I did eventually get it back."

The garland was finally completed at Ridgewood Golf Club, in Truro Heights, on Nov. 28th. It was officially measured by Jeff Hingley, a survey technician, and the final length totalled 915 feet 47 inches. "I had roughly guessed the length to be about 700 feet, so I was very surprised when I heard it was over 915 feet," says Carolann.

It will be a few months before she knows for certain if she has earned another world record. Official papers must be completed, signed by witnesses, and then sent off to England for the Guinness office to review.

The lengthy garland has all been dismantled. Pieces were given away and close to \$400 in donations were collected for the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation, Christmas Daddies and Children's Wish Foundation.

Will there be more record attempts in Carolann's future? "I have another idea in mind but I think I need a year to think it over," she says. "This record attempt was quite costly."

Carolann appreciated the support from Ridgewood Golf Club, Northern Pulp, who allowed her to cut brush on their land, and Wa-Su-Wek Ltd., of Liverpool, NS for the donation of wreath wire but she was unable to secure any other sponsors to offset the costs. For the time being, Carolann is still tying plenty of boughs, but for Christmas wreaths she sells, not world record garland.
