

Historic Sites

Along The Shore - St. Ambrose Catholic Church Acadia Mines

The Shoreline Journal, in collaboration with the Colchester Historical Society Archives, have inaugurated an ongoing feature utilizing a combination of the digital "A. F. Church Maps" to pin point the circa 1875 location of a Colchester site of historical importance, and connect it to an archival photograph of that site, in that frame.





The arrow pointer on map # 334 locates the site of St.Ambrose Catholic Church in what was then "Acadia Mines" and is now "Londonderry Mines". Built on the corner of Church and Furnace Street, this fine building served the rapidly growing numbers of Catholic families, whose men came to work in the newly opened

iron mining and milling operations. The church building and glebe house were built in 1871. The first Parish Priest was Father Mihan, who served the Parish until 1872. In 1881 the congregation built "St. Bridget's Hall" on the corner of Furnace and River Streets. It was a fine, three storey buildings, used by the whole community for school concerts, theatrical performances, boxing matches and in 1895, a horse show. All of these buildings, and many others, were burned in the great fire of 1920. With the demise of the mining industry and the result-

Hall closed in 1917, and the Catholic Parish acquired the building in 1920 and moved it to the site of the recently burned Chapel. A steeple and new windows were added to create the "St. Ambrose" of today.


