Onslow Belmont Fire Brigade Christmas Party, Annual General Meeting and Christmas Banquet

The Annual OBFB Christmas Party and Awards Banquet was held on Dec. 5th at the Fire Hall. A delicious meal was prepared by Trinity United Church and enjoyed by all. Walter McElhinney acted as emcee for the evening. Greetings were received from County Councillors Doug MacInnes, Tom Taggart and Ron Cavanaugh plus Mayor Bob Taylor and MLA Karen Casey.

Chief Greg Muise thanked the members for their hard work and dedication throughout the year, as well as the community for their generous and continued support for 2015.

Chief Muise reported on the year's activities and events. The municipal tax rate remained the same at 9 cents/\$100 assessment. New TRM 2 radios were installed in the trucks and identifier numbers for officers and trucks were changed to a three number system. The "I Am Responding" communications program was also implemented.

The largest purchase in 2015 was a fully equipped rescue utility vehicle, complete with trailer and storage box for supplies. Dash cams were installed in some of the trucks. New station wear was purchased for members.

Insurance coverage was upgraded to cover members 24 hours per day, 7 days a week. A committee is working on General Operating Guidelines for members.

The Harvest sale was very successful this year. During Fire Prevention week, members visited schools and an Open House was held at the hall.

Three new members joined the Brigade in 2015, one member resigned and one member retired.

OBFB responded to 194 calls in 2015- 3 grass fires, 7 flue fires, 93 medical calls, 16 misc. calls, 17 Mutual Aid calls, 48 motor vehicle accidents, 3 structure fires and 7 vehicle fires. Total damages for the year came to \$241,900. Since OBFB was established in 1961, there have been a total of 4451 calls answered and



\$5,791,559 in damages.

Total in-house training was 548 man hours combined hours plus 312 hours outside training. Sam Currie and Scott Faber attended Level 1 courses. Three members attended vehicle extraction courses at the Fire School, plus the Brigade held a vehicle extraction course one Saturday, thanks to Maritime Auto Salvage.

OBFB members participated in several community events including two dances, assistance at Kids Fun Day at Captain Cob's Corn Maze, Masstown Canada Day, parking at Saltscapes Expo, fire protection at Masstown Mud Bog, Memorial for Truro Police Constable Catherine Campbell, plus several parades. The OBFB float was awarded 1st Place in the Santa Claus Parade.

Sporting and Social events for 2015 included: inter-brigade sports, cribbage tournaments, dart tournament, MFFA Golf Tournament in PEI, CFFA Tournament in Brookfield, CFFA Curling, MFFA Curling (hosted by OBFB), slow pitch league, Family Skate, and Steak and Lobster Dinner.

Special Awards were presented at the banquet as follows: Stan Groves Junior Fire Fighter of the Year Award-Sam Currie; Clem MacKinnon Sportsmanship Award- Leo Morrow; John Petrasch Most Improved- Carl Gallant; Clifford MacDougall Fellowship Award- Leo Morrow and Ron Urquhart; Carl King Officer of the Year Award- Darrell Currie; Keith Hamilton Memorial Fire Fighter of the Year Award- Vanessa Piercy.

Long Term Service Awards were presented to Dan Dargavel (5 Years), Derek Richard (10 Years), Sean Foley (25 Years), Claire Peers (30 Years), Chester Sabean (45 Years) and Charlie MacKenzie (45 Years).
