Leefe Appointed to Facilitate Parrsboro-Cumberland Merger

John Leefe, former MLA and Mayor of Municipality of Queens, has been named as the liaison to work with the Town of Parrsboro to go through the process of shedding its status as a town and to amalgamate itself into the Municipality of the County of Cumberland.

Parrsboro's council and mayor initiated the process not because it is in a dire financial, but because of

major infrastructure projects which are needed in the small town in Cumberland South. In late August, town council applied to the provincial Utility and Review Board to dissolve the town and amalgamate with the county. The goal is to have the amalgamation completed for the 2016 municipal elections.

Some water improvement projects are underway and council is moving forward on planning a new wastewater

treatment plant, which under federal regulations must be completed by 2020. The town has the money to do the current projects and to do the planning, but with a \$5-Million price tag on the wastewater treatment project, current council felt the burden on taxpayers would be too heavy.

Bruce Wark a retired journalism professor who now lives in Parrsboro, is upset at the lack of consultation and residents were not given the opportunity to voice their opinion before an application was made to the Utility & Review Board and has asked that a plebiscite be held.

Mayor Lois Smith and Deputy Mayor Lisa Ward will represent the town on a transition committee which is aiming to have the merger with Cumberland completed in 2016. As reported earlier in the Shoreline, Town of Amherst, Pugwash, Oxford and other smaller municipalities in the Amherst area are studying their options for future governance.


Historic Sites

"GREAT VILLAGE POST OFFICE/ICE CREAM PARLOUR"



The Arrow pointer on map # 305 shows the location of the first "Stand-Alone" post office building in Great Village, built in the first years of the 20th Century; it was located between what was then MacLachlin's grocery store and the bridge. This photo, taken in the 1940's, shows the post office on the left hand side of the building and an ice cream parlor

on the right hand side. Over the years, the right hand side of the building housed many businesses, funeral parlor, bake shop, drug store. The first post office or "way station", as they were then known, in the "Village" was opened in the early 1870's, as part of McLachlin's general store, then moved to Blaikies store, which later became MacLachlin's. Angus Johnson was the first postmaster in this "circa" 1916 building, followed by David Cummings and Jud Chisholm. In the 1960's, a new postmaster bought the small building on the other side of MacLachlin's store, and turned it into the village post office which is still in use. This new building was moved, around 1900, from a site just up the hill, on the road to Londonderry. At that location, the building had been the local jail. Elizabeth Bishop, in her story "In The Village" brought the parcel for her mother in hospital, to postmaster Johnson in the featured building.
