

Riverside Hall Subject of \$582,000 Repurposing

A renovated and expanded Riverside Community Hall, Portapique is about to receive a \$582,000 repurposing. The Rotary Club of Truro is undertaking a major project to help serve the needed of the Portapique area residents, by proposing to transform the community hall into an appropriate venue. A presentation by the Rotary Club was made to Colchester Council on December 1st.

The initiative is not for the faint of heart. Total projected cost is \$582,000, with estimated direct costs of \$329,000, supported by \$253,000 from "in-kind" and community support. To-date over 300 hours of community labour, support has been forthcoming. The process to develop a plan and anticipated outcomes began with 1-on-1 consultations with residents identified by Trustees of the Community Hall.

During this stage, a clear vision was set: making the existing Community Hall fully accessible, and expanding the current building so it may be rented for events like meetings, weddings, or dances were

the key goals. Also, the addition of a proper outside play area for the community's children was determined to be of great importance.

Throughout June and July, Rotarians Andrew MacDonald, a resident of Portapique, and Matthew Berrigan engaged in discussions with community members in an effort to understand how the Rotary Club could help, what they would like to see in the area and what opportunities existed. On July 8, committee members met with 12 of the Portapique residents who were asked their opinions about the development of services within the Community Hall, their satisfaction with services, and what particular services are needed.

At a BBQ at the Community Hall on August 11, the Rotary Cares committee rolled out their plan to the community stakeholders, which was met with great enthusiasm, and offers of assistance. A launch event in late September saw about 25 people get together to clean up tree branches from

the yard, and pull three layers of wood paneling from the walls inside.

A second community day with 30 present was held on November 1; insulation and vapour barrier were installed in the existing hall, property clean-up continued and further discussions were held as to the future of the hall. The old stove was removed and a heat pump installed, and the electric panel upgraded

from 60 to 100 amps.

A third clean up day was held November 22, during which the new drywall was installed, signage was installed at the end of the road, and a donated piano was collected from Truro and brought to the hall.

Throughout the process, the goal of community sessions was to relay the ideas from the 1-on-1 consultations and engage new residents on additional ideas. A program outline and budget projections were developed. The community build up plus budget, included:

Purchase 1 acre lot \$13,000; Upgrade existing hall 16,000; Playground w/ theatre 160,000; Foundation/sports court 38,000; Exposed Beam renovation 60,000; Relocate Hall 15,000; Septic Field 25,000; Pavilion 75,000; 1200 ft Expansion 90,000; Kitchen upgrade 50,000 and Washrooms/amenities 40,000.

Because of infrastructure defects, it is proposed to relocate the existing building onto a new foundation and then construct a 1,200 sq ft expansion. A commercial grade kitchen to facilitate any requirements for various events.

Program funding estimates are listed as: Private Donation for land \$10,000; Province of NS 50,000; applications and discussions are in progress for Gov't/Other Partners 170,000; Community Fdn of NS 20,000; BBBS donation 5,000; Rotary Club donations 25,600; additional Rotary Club donations \$24,400 and Fundraisers/Public gifts 24,000.

The Rotary Club of Truro has partnered with the Community Foundation of Nova Scotia to receive donations from individuals through the "We Rise Again Fund" with a stated project goal of \$500,000.

Prospect research, cultivating prospects and identifying potential sources of gifts in kind is ongoing. The Rotary Club is working with Rural Roots Engineering, Debert on the building renovations and building addition. Cobiquid Consulting, Economy is detailing the playground area.

The proposed exterior design includes: Because the existing hall extends over the property line, and the foundation needs to be replaced, the recommendation is to lay a new foundation and move the existing building into the center of the addition. The club has received verbal commitment from Irving Equipment to move the building. There have been conversations with the Home Hardware Distribution Centre and the Home Building Centre in Truro regarding providing supplies for the build.

Between in-kind donations of supplies, and community members doing much of the manual labour, the Rotary Club is confident they will be able to
