Interesting Facts about July 1st

Here are some interesting things about July 1st! July 1st is the 182nd day of the year (183rd in leap years) in the Gregorian calendar. There are 183 days remaining until the end of the year. The end of this day marks the halfway point of a leap year. It also falls on the same day of the week as New Year's Day in a leap year.

Some things that have happened on July 1st: in 69AD Tiberius Julius Alexander ordered his Roman legions in Alexandria to swear allegiance to Vespasian as emperor. 1520 - La Noche Triste; Joint Mexican Indian force led by Aztecs under Cuitlâhuac defeat Spanish Conquistadors under Hernán Cortés. 1770 -Lexell's Comet passed closer to the Earth than any other comet in recorded history, approaching to a distance of 0.0146a.u.

1782- American privateer attack Lunenburg, Nova Scotia. 1837 - A system of the civil registration of births, marriages and deaths is established in England and Wales. 1862 - American Civil War; The Battle of Malvern Hill takes place, the final battle in the Seven Days Campaign, part of the George B. McClellan's Peninsula Campaign. 1863 - American Civil War: The Battle of Gettysburg begins.1878 -Canada joins the Universal Postal Union.

1881 - The world's first international telephone call is made between St. Stephen, New Brunswick, Canada, and Calais, Maine, United States. 1898 - Spanish-American War: The Battle of San Jaun Hill is fought in Santiago de Cuba. 1908 - SOS is adopted as the international Distress signal. 1916 - World War I: First day on the Somme - On the first

day of the Battle of the Somme 19,000 soldiers of the British Army are killed and 40,000 wounded.

1931- United Airlines begins service (as Boeing Air Transport). 1935- Regina, Saskatchewan police and Royal Canadian Mounted Police ambush strikers participating in On-to-Ottawa-Trek. 1958 - The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation links television broadcasting Canada across microwave. 1958 - Flooding of Canada's St. Lawrence Seaway begins. 1963 - Zip Codes are introduced for United States mail.

1966-The first color television transmission to Canada takes place from Toronto. 1967- Canada celebrates the 100th anniversary of the British North American Act, 1867, which officially made Canada its own federal dominion. 1972 - The first Gay Pride march in England takes place. 1979 - Sony introduces the



Walkman. 1980 - O Canada officially becomes the national anthem of Canada.

2007 - Smoking in England is banned in all public indoor spaces. With the ban already in force in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland, this means it is illegal to smoke in indoor public places anywhere in the UK. The ban is also put into effect in Australia. There are many, many more items for this list but this should be enough to interest you! Enjoy your Canada Day with gratitude!
