Recruitment and Registration committee members did an outstanding job. There were 20 registered teams this year compared to nine teams in 2010.

The first-ever Honorary Chairperson, Stephen O'Regan, shared "his story" as he welcomed the teams and the public at the Opening Ceremony.

Madison Tennant again earned the individual youth award raising over \$2000.00. Frank Hartman received the adult individual award for raising close to \$1600.00. Kylee Smith was presented a ribbon for her individual fundraising effort of almost \$500.00.

Overall it was a tremendous success with Parrsboro and the surrounding communities and counties contributing over \$39,000.00 toward the research, awareness, and prevention of a disease that has in some way affected each and every one of

Parrsboro Wharf Undergoes an Overhaul

This winter and spring has been an active one at Parrsboro Harbour, but not with ships coming and going. Actually, Arnold Wood Construction, Parrsboro has been busy bringing new life back into the wharf. Initially he was awarded a contract to remove thousands of tons of gravel from the Harbour channel as a result of turbulent tides filling in the channel.

When vessels had access to the wharf, they could seek protection from storms, but over time the channel had all but filled in. Then during the harshness of winter, things changed. Harsh storms with high tides caused extensive damage to the wharf structure, and also caused a silting and filling in of the harbour.

Instead of clearing the passage, Arnold Wood Construction was awarded contract in the \$50,000.00 range to repair the wharf's super-structure.

Once they started on the superstructure, damage was much more





extensive. Wood's construction team spent most of the winter repairing the wharf superstrucght people were employed, repair-

ture. Over the course of the job eight people were employed, repairing many of the timbers, braces and replaced many bolts. New ladders were installed. Well over 500 bolts, some as long as 42 inches were used to repair the wharf.

Now that the two contracts have been completed, boats can find protection from storms on the inside of the wharf. Boaters will no longer have to make their entry/exit at the highest tides.

Fishermen will no longer be confined to exposing their boats to potential damage by having to use the outside of the wharf where storms have the potential to cause damage. The inside section of the wharf is open and the silt has been artfully applied to the beach leaving once again a pleasing view of the harbour.
