Historic Sites Along The Shore - UPPER FIVE ISLANDS SCHOOL

The Shoreline Journal, in collaboration with the Colchester Historical Society Archives, have inaugurated an ongoing feature utilizing a combination of the digital "A. F. Church Maps" to pin point the circa 1875 location of a Colchester site of historical importance, and connect it to an archival photograph of that site, in that frame.

The arrow pointer on map #318 pinpoints the location of the Upper Five Islands School. The photo of this building was taken after it was renovated as a commercial enterprise, and is, we believe, the same building pictured in the "Landmarks" section of "The Story of Five Islands" The 1861 Nova Scotia census revealed a deplorable state of education in the Province and that a total of nearly 115,000 children were unable to read and write. In

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1863 it was revealed that more than 50,000 children between the ages of 5 and 15 years were not attending school.

These facts inspired the Nova Scotia

These facts inspired the Nova Scotia Legislature to pass Sir Charles Tupper's "School Act Of 1864". By 1870, a total of 76,237 pupils were enrolled in public schools in the province, the majority of them in small country schools like the one pictured.

It was reported in September of 1874, that 66 schools had been completed to that date, and 46 more were under construction. The buildings were far from idyllic, most with no well water, and some did not even have outhouses, "or suitable shelter in nearby woods".


The lack of equipment in those early schools Vilas indicated by an article in the Journal of Education, September of 1875, which asked, "Will not every board of trustees see that the school under their care is supplied with a good, serviceable, spacious black board without delay?"

Through consolidation and lower enrollment, all of these small schools are gone, some have been demolished, others turned into private homes and businesses. The era of the one room, one teacher, all grades, is gone

forever.
