The Wentworth Yard Sale was held at the Wentworth Recreation Centre for two days from 8 am to 2:30 pm over the Victoria Day weekend on Saturday and Monday. The sale was organized by Betty Curry, past-chair of Recreation Centre executive. Twenty tables with yard sale items were assembled in the large hall.

Items included baby clothes and clothes for all other ages, outdoor and indoor maintenance supplies, books, music records, jewelry, food, art, photography, quilts, toys, taxidermy...one could go on for several pages. Several vendors reported making a nice profit from their sales, and those attending often left carrying large parcels.

One table was especially interesting and inspiring because it brought to the attention of everyone present that it is essential to the educational, economic, cultural, and social health of this community to keep the Wentworth Consolidated Elementary School at its present site. At this table impor-

tant and tireless workers of the WSSA (Wentworth School Sustainability Association) Joanne Ferdinand, Stephen Ferdinand, and Laurel Adams were raffling off a quilt made by Georgie Patriquin and donated by Shirley Tuttle in order to raise funds for the Wentworth Community School Council, which provides activities in the community and supports in general the Wentworth School.

Unfortunately, the Chignecto-Central Regional School Board (CCRSB) has decided to close the Wentworth School which could happen in June, 2015, unless residents can raise enough money to keep it open.

The Wentworth School Sustainability Association (WSSA) is hoping, as well as the residents of Wentworth, that the School Board (CCRSB) responsible for this area will rescind their decision to close the Wentworth School and wait for the new comprehensive review of the public education system now being done and directed solely by the people of Nova

Scotia (to quote Myra Freeman, Chairwoman of the Education Minister's Panel on Education).

According to the Education Act (which could be changed by the current Legislature), School Boards have the final say on school closures. Previously the NDP Education Minister, Ramona Jennex, recommended a halt to all active school reviews because the current process was not working well. All Nova Scotia School Boards agreed to the halt, except the Chignecto-Central District School Board.

Current Liberal Education Minister, Karen Casey, asked the CCRSB to extend Wentworth School's closure date from June 2015 to June 2016. The Nova Scotia Legislature recently passed legislation, with PC Caucus support, to implement a new school review process. The Honourable Jamie Baillie, MLA for District 6 and Leader of the Opposition, has asked the CCRSB to rescind their closure motion of the Wentworth School or provide a one year's extension for closure from 2015 to 2016.

One would think CCRSB would now rescind their unfair closure process at Wentworth, River John, and Maitland since the old review rules for school closures, which they are supporting, have since been discarded. Therefore, I congratulate Joanne Ferdinand, Stephen Ferdinand, and Lauren Adams for bringing the Wentworth School issue to their table at the May 2014 Yard Sale in Wentworth.

A canteen was available during the Yard Sale and provided sandwiches, doughnuts, and drinks. Kitchen helpers were Rev. Brian DeLong (Wentworth United Church minister), Jordan Sprague, Ben Ferdinand, MacKenzie Moore, and Wee Wana Sprague.

## Parrsboro's Artistic Display to Continue until Oct 26<sup>TH</sup>

In 2013 Doris Soley's inspirations of wrought iron sculptures garnered a lot of media attention and were a large drawing card for tourists and locals. Encouraged by the success of the wrought iron sculptures installed on Parrsboro's Main Street, other local artisans have contributed to a create a much larger display. As a result, Parrsboro hosted its first Art Installation Fiesta on Main Street on Saturday, May 3. The 2014 street art show will continue until October 26th.

With Doris Soley's work, which attracted so much interest from both local and visitors last year, already installed it was easier for Taylor Redmond to guide the day introducing the fascinating art works from other local artisans, who decided to contribute to Parrsboro's larger visual attraction.

New displays for 2014 include: Tim Freeman's - Brian the Buck and Dog & Wolf; Bill Shaw's - Clothes (Wooden) Horses; Heather's Lawson's - Seed Pod and Stone Stool. Also part of the 2014 display are: Mystery Pipes and Man "O" War music producing displays by artist John Little; Bird Houses displayed as Nester Fence by Sweet Briar, Krista Wells, Jill Langford, Taylor Redmond, Sunshine Inn, Harbourview Restaurant, Donna Hanna & Linda Williagar.

Folks are constantly stopping to see, comprehend and take pictures with the many displays. Business owners are excited about

the additional interest the displays will create and cause tourists to come to the area just to see the unique artwork. Last year positive comments were received from many tourists. The art will be on display until Oct. 26. In other artistic happen-
