

Summer Starts at Your Local Public Library

Nova Scotia public libraries will keep children, teens and families learning, reading and engaged over the summer with everything from gaming to Lego robotics, craft programs, outdoor activities, engineering challenges, reptile exhibits, cooking, contests, prizes and more. The TD Summer Reading Club was launched on June 16 and includes several kick-off parties in local libraries until the end of the month. The bilingual program for children celebrates Canadian authors, illustrators and stories. In addition to this, there is the Nova Scotia Public Libraries Summer Tour program which includes 75 shows and workshops scheduled from June to August. This year's tour features: Adventures in Moon Land, with actor Rhys Bevan-John; Mi'kmaw dancer and singer Trevor Gould; Classical Munchkins, presented by Symphony Nova Scotia; storyteller Shauntay Grant; drawing workshops, with artist Emma FitzGerald and science and robotic workshops with SuperNOVA. No plastic straws at A&W

A&W Food Services of Canada Inc. marked World Oceans Day by eliminating all plastic straws from all restaurants by the end of this year. It will be the first quick service restaurant chain in North America to make this commitment. A&W will provide guests with the option of a paper straw. The paper straws are 100% biodegradable, compostable and are sustainably sourced. They last 2-3 hours in a drink without breaking down, but naturally biodegrade in 3-6 months in the environment. This switch to paper will keep 82 million plastic straws out of landfills every year.

Doctors Nova Scotia welcomes Dr Tim Holland

Dr. Tim Holland, of Truro, N.S., was installed as Doctors Nova Scotia's President during the association's annual conference on Saturday, June 9, 2018 in Sydney. Dr. Holland graduated from Dalhousie Medical School in 2011 and completed his family medicine residency in 2013. Following his residency, he travelled the province, working in multiple locations as part of the Rural Emergency Locum Program, before settling down at the Colchester Regional Hospital in Truro. In 2014, he co-founded the Newcomer Health Clinic (formerly the Transitional Health Clinic for Refugees) in Halifax; in 2015, he started practising family medicine part time at the Sipekne'katik Health Centre in Indian Brook. Dr. Holland currently practises in all three locations.
