Autism Spectrum Disorder Supports

A new pilot program is supporting parents of toddlers with autism spectrum disorder. QuickStart Nova Scotia is a one-on-one parent-coaching program that uses play-based activities to help parents further develop their child's communication and social skills. The pilot program is initially being offered in Halifax through Autism Nova Scotia. The QuickStart Nova Scotia program is a model adopted from the QuickStart Early Intervention Program in Ottawa in partnership with Emerging Minds. Additional partners include the IWK Health Centre, Nova Scotia Health Authority, Nova Scotia Hearing and Speech Centres, and Nova Scotia Early Childhood Development Intervention Services. The province is investing \$2 million over four years to support QuickStart which will be delivered to up to 35 toddlers (12-36 months old) in its first year, and up to 50 in each of the following three years. Nine autism resource centres have also been created to ensure families in rural areas have better access to the information, supports and services available to them. The locations are: Amherst, Halifax, Hebbville, Lunenburg Co.; Kingston, Kings Co.; New Glasgow, Port Hawkesbury, Sydney, Truro and Yarmouth. The autism resource centres opened in 2017. Film Productions Announced

Nova Scotia Business Inc. (NSBI) has announced three newly approved productions through the Nova Scotia Film and Television Production Incentive Fund. Documentary, Hear! Here!, produced by Rarely Heard Films Inc., has been approved for a funding commitment of \$21,615 based on an eligible Nova Scotia expenditure of \$ 78,600. The TV mini-series, Short Film Face Off 2019, produced by Short Stop Pictures XII Ltd., has been approved for a funding commitment of \$82,589 based on an eligible Nova Scotia expenditure of \$300,323. Documentary, History's Horrible Humans, produced by Underfoot Productions Inc., has been approved for a funding commitment of \$272,935 based on eligible Nova Scotia expenditure of \$941,155. Progress on Ecological Forestry

Scientists, researchers, and subject-matter experts are working with Department of Lands and Forestry staff to improve Nova Scotia's Crown land forests. These individuals are members of the department's project teams that are addressing changes recommended by Prof. Bill Lahey in his review of forest practices in Nova Scotia. Harvest improvements are already happening on Crown land, with more trees being retained on site. It is preferential to retain longer-lived species, with the objective of a greater mix of species, sizes and ages. The project teams are focused on: reviewing the current pre-treatment assessment process and updating the forest management guide; a peer-reviewed assessment of Nova Scotia's natural disturbance agents, like fires, floods, insect infestations and large storms and their impacts on harvest planning; reviewing the old forest policy and criteria, and revising policy following input from stakeholders; defining high-production forestry and develop procedures and criteria for implementation on Crown land, followed by a framework for site selection and designation; investigating the efficiency of small-scale wood energy projects and a converting some government buildings to wood heat energy for the 2019-20 heating season; establishing a manual that includes priority policy and procedures to govern the Endangered Species Act and completing outstanding recovery plans and status reports as needed for species solely listed in Nova Scotia and designing an outcomes-based approach to Crown forest management. New Immigration Pilot and Changes to Existing Programs

A new immigration pilot and changes to existing streams will attract more entrepreneurs and skilled workers to the province. The new Occupations in Demand pilot will target specific professions, starting with continuing care assistants and truck drivers. Nova Scotia's two entrepreneur immigration streams, Entrepreneur Stream and International Graduate Entrepreneur, are also being updated. Existing business owners will now be eligible under the entrepreneur stream and can include operating expenses towards the required minimum investment. The ownership requirements for international graduates looking to start a business will change from 100 per cent to one third. Changes will allow for collaboration with other entrepreneurs and give recent international graduates more flexibility in achieving entrepreneurship and immigration goals.
