School Improvements Funding Announced

Within our coverage area three schools will receive joint federal and provincial funding through the Investing in Canada plan to support improvements in schools in Cumberland-Colchester.

The Government of Canada is investing \$1,768,000 toward six projects through the COVID-19 Resilience Infrastructure Stream of the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program. The Government of Nova Scotia

is contributing \$442,000 to the projects.

Parrsboro Elementary School will receive \$72,000 federal money for new building automation system / controls. Valley Elementary School will undergo a roof replacement and school entry-way addition with \$520,000 federal money.

The federal government will spend \$252,000 for a roof replacement at Hilden Elementary School.

Affordable Housing Developments

Affordable housing developments in three Nova Scotia communities will receive support from the provincial and federal governments under the National Housing Strategy. \$3.25 million will be invested to help build 65 units for seniors and low-income Nova Scotians. In Bridgewater, \$1.25 million will create 25 affordable units. Five one-bedroom units will be accessible, and five two-bedroom units will be fully barrier-free. In Port Hawkesbury, \$1.2 million will preserve and improve 24 vacant affordable units that will be rented significantly below the market rate. In the Oyster Pond area of Halifax Regional Municipality, \$800,000 will support the conversion of the former Jeddore Lakeville Elementary School into 16 affordable one-bedroom units for seniors. Medical Services Monitoring Program

Government has finalized new contracts with Medavie Blue Cross to administer the province's Medical Services Insurance (MSI) and other programs, effective June 1, 2021. Under the contracts, Medavie will administer the prescription monitoring program, provincial health card program, payments to physicians, pharmacare programs and ancillary programs such as optometry and prosthetics. Some of the key enhancements to be delivered through the new contracts include: electronic health card services, allowing Nova Scotians to apply for and renew their health cards online; provider and resident online portals for more efficient access; tools to support the voluntary collection of race-based health data and improved indicators that will be continually monitored to assess performance. The two new contracts are a six-year agreement for the administration of MSI and Pharmacare, and a four-year agreement for the administration of the Nova Scotia Prescription Monitoring Program.

Mi'kmaw Livelihood Fisheries Class Action to Launch

Hubert Francis (Elsipogtog), Clifford Paul (Membertou), Cody Caplin (Eel River Bar), and Jeffery James Bernard (Lennox Island), are intending to launch a class action on behalf of all status Indians who are Mi'kmaw and who can claim successor rights to the Peace and Friendship Treaties of the 1700's. The Treaty right, as declared by the Supreme Court of Canada in *Marshall*, was a promise by the Crown that all Mi'kmaw persons could fish anywhere and trade the fish they caught. The promise was to all Mi'kmaw wherever they were located and as *Marshall* verified, applied to salt water fishing and was to facilitate the economic well-being of the Mi'kmaw people. In order to commence the class action, **funding is required**. This funding should be considered by all Bands on behalf of and for the benefit of their members who wish to earn a livelihood from fishing, and all Mi'kmaw organizations and others who wish to advance the right on behalf of all Mi'kmaw. Funding for Housing in Halifax, Annapolis Valley

The government of Nova Scotia is providing \$6.4 million to create permanent supportive housing for people experiencing homelessness in Halifax and the Annapolis Valley. As part of the announcement on May 31, the Affordable Housing Association of Nova Scotia will receive \$3.5 million to purchase properties in the Halifax area that will provide housing for people with the highest needs who might otherwise remain homeless. The province has also committed \$1.8 million per year to cover annual operational costs and on-site client services, such as clinical care, peer support, addictions and mental health supports.
