Scott Armstrong, MP delivered \$7,715.00 funding for the Ship's Company Theatre Society in ceremonies on Tuesday, May 18th. The funding will enable the local performing arts society to present the 2010 season in its namesake performance venue.

The Ship's Company Theatre is one of the community's most well-known tourist attractions featuring the MV Kipawo, one of Canada's longest-running ferries and the Company's original home, in the outdoor lobby.

The funding of \$7,715 is provided through the Canada Arts Presentation Fund of the Department of Canadian Heritage. This program gives Canadians increased access to the variety and richness of Canada's culture through professional arts festivals, presentations of live professional performances, and other artistic experiences.

This summer the Company

will present its eleventh summer concert series from July to September, comprising seven concerts held each Monday evenings. The 2010 series will also feature three threatre presentations including one for young children.

In making the announcement, on behalf of the Honourable James Moore, Minister of Canadian Heritage and Official Languages, Scott Armstrong, MP Cumberland, Colchester, Musquodoboit Valley said, "Our Government is pleased to support this annual summer series in Parrsboro. Tourism is very important to the economy of this historic town, and I am pleased that both tourists and residents alike will once again be able to enjoy high-level entertainment and its positive impact on this community and beyond."

"The Ship's Company Theatre Society is a Cumberland County treasure," said Mr. Armstrong. "Through its emphasis on new works from Maritime writers, the Society's productions not only entertain us, but also help us tell our story. This is both relevant and of great benefit to the entire region in terms of tourism and economic growth."

The society provides seasonal employment for 35 and a number of these positions provide valuable training to students through student employment programs. The funding level of \$7,715 represents an increase of \$1,215, to support its Second Stage products and children's stage activities.

"We're very grateful to receive this funding from the Government of Canada," said Matthew Tiffin, the Ship's Company Theatre's Artistic Producer. "Quite simply, it is essential to our operations and goes a long way in helping us produce and host our great Atlantic-Canadian musicians, actors, writers, and artists. This funding gives a

nificant damage to the natural sea barrier at Advocate Harbour. Community members are concerned that the damage may lead to flooding, which could compromise infrastructure, agriculture and private property.

On behalf of the Canadian Coast Guard, CREDA will undertake an engineering assessment of the adequacy of the area's natural sea barrier and underlying soil conditions. The project will involve geotechnical studies to determine future requirements to

ensure the stability of the seawall and the protection of the community.

"Addressing the Advocate Harbour sea barrier has been identified as a priority for the Association," said Rhonda Kelly, Executive Director of CREDA. "It is our role to increase communities' ability to overcome challenges and approach goals using local resources and expertise—today's investment will allow us to fulfill this role in the community of Advocate Harbour."
